
The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks sincerely hopes the 2023-2024 Outdoor Di-

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

License Information

FISHING LICENSE (SALTWATER AND FRESHWATER)

Resident: Each resident of Mississippi ages 16-64, fishing in the fresh or marine waters of Mississippi, including lakes and reservoirs but NOT to include privately owned ponds and streams, shall be required to buy a fishing license. A freshwater fishing license is required to fish all public waters north of Interstate 10. A saltwater fishing license is required to fish all public waters south of U.S. Highway 90. Either a freshwater or saltwater fishing license can be used on all public waters south of Interstate 10 and north of U.S. Highway 90. If exempt from purchasing a license see "License Exemptions".

Non-Resident: All non-resident anglers, except for minors under 16, are required to obtain a fishing license while fishing in the fresh or marine waters of Mississippi. Louisiana residents must purchase both freshwater and saltwater licenses to fish in the marine waters of Mississippi.

HUNTING LICENSE

Resident: Each resident of Mississippi ages 16-64, must obtain a hunting license, except while hunting on lands titled in his/ her name. Any person 65 or older, or any person otherwise exempt from obtaining a hunting license, must have documentation with him/her at all times while hunting as described in "License Exemptions."

Non-Resident: All non-resident hunters, except for minors under 16, are required to obtain a hunting license while hunting in the State of Mississippi.

HUNTER EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

All persons born on or after January 1, 1972, must satisfactorily complete a hunter education course approved by MDWFP before purchasing a Mississippi hunting license. A child older than 12 and younger than 16 must have a certificate of satisfactory completion of a hunter education course approved by the department before hunting alone in the state. A child older than 12 and younger than 16 may hunt without having a certificate of hunter education if the child is in the presence and under the direct supervision of a Mississippi licensed or exempt hunter at least 21 years old when the child is hunting. A child younger than 12 must be in the presence and under the direct supervision of a licensed or exempt hunter at least 21 years old when the child is hunting. A resident apprentice hunting license may be issued to a resident older than 16 who does not have the required certificate of hunter education. An apprentice license may be issued only once to a resident. The apprentice hunting licensee must be accompanied by a licensed or exempt resident hunter at least 21 years old when hunting. If it is determined that the holder was not entitled to issuance or obtained the license or hunter education certificate by fraudulent means, the license will be revoked or canceled. It is unlawful to issue a hunting license to any person without proof of completion of the hunter education course, except those born before Jan. 1, 1972, or residents purchasing a onetime apprentice license.

DUPLICATE HUNTER/BOATER EDUCATION CARD

If you have lost your hunter/boater education card, please go to www.mdwfp.com/ education-outreach/hunter-education/ to download a certificate or to purchase a duplicate card for a \$3 fee.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS

A person's domicile is that person's principal or primary home or place of abode. A "principal or primary home or place of abode" is that home or place in which a person's habitation is fixed and to which he/she, whenever absent, has the present intention of returning after a departure of absence regardless of the duration of absence. The burden of proving the domicile shall be on the person claiming such status. A current and valid Mississippi driver's license or Mississippi issued identification shall be proof of domicile/residency for the purpose of obtaining a Mississippi resident hunting or fishing license. The Department may prescribe and consider other means of proving domicile/residency. Please contact the License Bureau at (601) 432-2055 for further information or at mdwfp.com. In the case of minors, domicile of the parents shall be used as evidence of the minor's domicile. Any person with a valid driver's license from another state will not be considered for a resident hunting and/or fishing license (see exceptions). A person who obtains a license under an assumed name or makes a materially false statement to obtain a license is guilty of a felony and shall be subject to a fine of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) or may be imprisoned for a term of one year or both. You may be denied a resident hunting license if you fail to provide adequate proof. If using a Mississippi driver's license as proof of residency, please make sure license has not expired before purchasing a hunting/ fishing license. Exceptions: Even if you are domiciled in another state, you may purchase a resident hunting/fishing license if you provide either a current identification card from a Mississippi college or university (in which you are enrolled as a student in good standing); or a current military ID card showing that you are an active member of the Armed Forces (excluding Reserves and the National Guard) and a copy of the orders assigning you to a Mississippi military base.

LICENSE EXEMPTIONS Youth License Exemptions

Mississippi Residents under 16 are exempt from purchasing a hunting or fishing license. Individuals exempt based on these criteria may purchase a voluntary Youth Exempt license by providing their social security number along with a copy of their parent/legal guardian's driver's license to establish residency.

Disabled License Exemptions

Mississippi Residents who are blind, paraplegic, a multiple-amputee, adjudged 100% disabled by the Social Security Administration, or 100% service-connected disabled by the Veterans Administration or Railroad Retirement Board are NOT required to purchase a hunting or fishing license. Residents exempt based on these criteria are required to have proof of residency, disability status or other physical impairment in their possession while engaged in hunting and fishing activities unless an exempt license is purchased. The Disabled Exempt license is an annual privilege. Applications are available online at www.mdwfp.com.

Military Exemption

Any Mississippi resident who is a member of the U.S. Armed Forces, including the Reserves and National Guard, and on active duty outside the state of Mississippi is not required to purchase or have in his/ her possession a hunting or fishing license while engaged in such activities while on leave from active duty. Such resident shall have in his/her possession an official military leave form. MDWFP Hunter Education requirements apply to residents who meet the military exemption status.

Senior License Exemption (Resident Only)

Mississippi residents 65 and older are exempt from purchasing a hunting or freshwater fishing license. Residents exempt based on these criteria are required to have proof of age and Mississippi residency in their possession while engaged in hunting and freshwater fishing activities unless a voluntary Resident Senior Exempt license is purchased. The Resident Senior Exempt license is a valid lifetime privilege as long as you are a Mississippi resident.

SENIOR SALTWATER LICENSE (RESIDENT ONLY)

Effective July 1, 2010, residents 65 and older are required to purchase a saltwater fishing license if fishing South of U.S.

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License Information

Highway 90. The Senior Saltwater License is a valid lifetime privilege as long as you are a Mississippi resident.

WATERFOWL STAMP

A state waterfowl stamp and federal duck stamp is required for any person 16 or older when hunting any waterfowl species, including Lifetime license holders. Physical or electronic proof of purchase is sufficient. However, if a physical stamp is in possession, it must be signed by the hunter across the face of the stamp. The electronic federal duck stamp is good for 45 days from date of purchase. The actual stamp will be mailed within 45 days.

SMALL GAME/FISHING LICENSE

Any resident purchasing the combination small game hunting/freshwater fishing license for the use of freshwater fishing will not be required to provide a hunter education number. Any resident purchasing the combination small game hunting/ freshwater fishing license for the use of hunting small game will be required to provide a hunter education number.

TRAPPING

A trapping license is required of anyone 16 and older who traps furbearers (bobcat, mink, muskrat, opossum, otter, raccoon, and weasel) and/ or nuisance animals (beaver, coyote, fox, skunk, nutria, and wild hogs). An All Game Hunting License is also an acceptable license when trapping wild hogs. A trapping license is not required for persons trapping on lands titled in their name. This license shall be required of each assistant or helper 16 or older employed or used by a trapper. A trapping license is required to sell skins or carcasses of any fur-bearing animal (see additional information in General Hunting Regulations and Information-Trapping).

COMMERCIAL FISHING/ SLAT BASKET

Persons who possess a valid Freshwater Commercial Fishing License are allowed to fish gill nets, trammel nets, hoop nets, trotlines, slat baskets (with slat basket license), crawfish traps and shrimp traps, and/or sell non-game gross fish, minnows and non-native fish taken from the freshwaters of Mississippi. See the Commercial Fishing brochure for information or go to www.mdwfp.com.

Any person using a slat basket in Mississippi waters must have a valid slat basket license for each slat basket. You cannot purchase a slat-basket license unless you have a Freshwater Commercial Fishing License.

FRESHWATER FISHING GUIDE LICENSE

A Freshwater Guide License is required for anyone that provides fishing guide services on public waters in Mississippi north of I-10. CPR Training, First-Aid Training from an American Red Cross- or American Heart Association-certified trainer or course, and Boater Education is required to purchase a freshwater Guide License. A U.Ŝ. Coast Guard Captain's License may be substituted for CPR, First Aid, and Boater Education. Mississippi Residents are required to have a valid Sportsman License on file and proof of residency/domicile in the state of Mississippi for 12 consecutive months before the issuance of license. Non-Residents are required to have a valid annual Freshwater Fishing license on file.

FRESHWATER GUIDE BOAT LICENSE

An annual boat license must be purchased for any vessel being used for fishing guide services. A valid boat registration, driver's license, and proof of liability insurance (not less than \$100,000) are required to purchase a Freshwater Guide Boat License. Freshwater Guide Boat decal will be included with the Freshwater Guide Boat License, mailed to the address provided at the time of purchase.

License Information

DEER AND TURKEY PERMIT

Non-Residents are required to have a deer or turkey permit for hunting during all deer seasons and spring turkey season, unless individuals possess a Non-Resident Native Lifetime License. These permits must be purchased in addition to All Game, 7-Day All Game, or 3-Day All Game Hunting.

NON-RESIDENT PUBLIC LANDS TURKEY PERMIT

In addition to relevant All Game licenses and general Turkey Permit above; non-residents must additionally acquire a Nonresident Public Lands Turkey Permit before hunting turkey on open public lands during the first 14 days of the spring season. Open public lands include National Forests, National Wildlife Refuges, Corps of Engineers lands., etc., that have statewide seasons without special regulations. Allocation of Non-resident Public Lands Turkey Permits are conducted via a special drawing and is not available for purchase on demand. See www.mdwfp. com for application dates and information.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA USER PERMIT

Residents and Non-Residents using any state-operated Wildlife Management Area except those exempt from purchasing an annual hunting or fishing license, must purchase a Wildlife Management Area (WMA) User Permit. However, WMA User permits are required only for hunting, fishing, and trapping on U.S. Forest Service WMAs.

ARMED FORCES 14-DAY HUNTING/FISHING LICENSE

Non-Residents who are active members of the United States Armed Forces (excluding Reserves and the National Guard) may purchase a special Armed Forces 14-Day Hunting/Fishing license. Only two Armed Forces 14-Day Hunting/Fishing licenses may be purchased per license year. Proof of active military status is required. This license is processed at the Jackson Office only. Applications are available online at www.mdwfp.com. MDWFP Hunter Education requirements apply to all non-residents who purchase the Armed Forces 14-day Hunting/Fishing License.

MISSISSIPPI LIFETIME LICENSE

Resident Lifetime license applicants must provide proof that they have been domiciled in the state of Mississippi for a minimum of 18 consecutive months before issuance of such license. All resident applicants' birth through age 12 must include a certified copy of their birth certificate. All non-resident Mississippi native applicants must include an original or notarized copy of the long-form birth certificate showing the applicant was born in Mississippi and their parent's address was in Mississippi at the time of birth OR for an applicant not born in Mississippi, the parents' address was in Mississippi at the time of applicants' birth.

All non-resident Mississippi native MIL applicants must include a certified copy of an original birth certificate of parent showing that parent was born in Mississippi and additional office documents indicating parent was on active military services at the time of the applicant's birth. Lifetime applications are processed at the Jackson office only. Applications are available at www. mdwfp.com. Any address change by license holders should be reported to the License Department. MDWFP Hunter Education requirements apply to all Lifetime License Applicants.

White-Tailed Deer Hunting

Deer Management Unit (DMU) lines are based on soil regions using highways and interstates as dividing boundaries.

DEER MANAGEMENT UNITS

North Central: Private and open public lands in Alcorn, Benton, Desoto, Marshall, Tate, Tippah counties.

Hills: All areas except the Delta, North Central, and Southeast Deer Management Units. OPEN PUBLIC LANDS include National Forests, excluding the Holly Springs National Forest, Corps of Engineers lands, etc., that have statewide seasons without special regulations.

Southeast: Private and open public lands south of U.S. Highway 84 and east of MS Highway 35.

Delta: Private and open public lands west of I-55 and north of I-20 plus areas south of I-20 and west of U.S. Highway 61.

BAG LIMITS Antiered Buck Deer

With the exception of the North Central DMU, the statewide bag limit on antlered buck deer is one (1) buck per day and three (3) per annual season. One (1) of these three (3) may have hardened antlers that do not meet the DMU legal antler requirements

on private land and Holly Springs National Forest. Antlered buck bag limit in the North Central DMU is one (1) buck per day and four (4) per annual season. No antler restrictions apply to this DMU. All four bucks may have any sized hardened antlers. For youth hunters fifteen (15) years of age and younger, hunting on private land and authorized state and federal lands, all three (3) of the three (3) buck bag limit may be any antlered deer.


Antierless Deer

Private Land: With the exception of the North Central and Southeast DMUs, the statewide annual bag limit on antlerless deer is five (5). The bag limit for private lands in the North Central DMU is ten (10) antlerless deer per season. Antlerless deer are male or female deer which do not have hardened antler above the natural hairline. Only two (2) antlerless deer may be harvested from the Southeast DMU. There is no daily bag limit on antlerless deer; except, only one (1) anterless deer per day may be harvested in the Southeast DMU.

Ú.S. Forest Service Lands: The bag limit is one (1) per day, not to exceed five (5) per annual season except in the Southeast DMU, which is two (2) per annual season.

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Legal Bucks: Hills and Southeast Deer Management Units

A legal buck is defined as having EITHER a minimum inside spread of 10 inches OR one main beam at least 13 inches long.

Estimating a 10-inch spread is accomplished by observing a buck's ears in the alert position. When in the alert position, the distance from ear-tip to ear-tip measures approximately 14 inches. If the OUTSIDE of each antler beam is 1 inch inside the ear-tip, the inside spread is approximately 10 inches.



To estimate a 13-inch main beam, the buck's head must be observed from the side. If the tip of the main beam extends to the front of the eye, main beam length is approximately 13 inches.



Legal Bucks: Delta Deer Management Unit

A legal buck is defined as having EITHER a minimum inside spread of 12 inches OR one main beam at least 15 inches long.

Estimating a 12-inch spread is accomplished by observing a buck's ears in the alert position. When in the alert position. the distance from ear-tip to ear-tip measures approximately 15 inches. If the OUTSIDE of each antler beam reaches the ear-tip. the inside spread is approximately 12 inches. Therefore, if the outside of both antler beams reach the ear tips, the buck is legal.



To estimate a 15-inch main beam, the buck's head must be observed from the side. If the tip of the main beam extends between the front of the eye and the tip of the nose, main beam length is approximately 15 inches.



Chronic Wasting Disease

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) was discovered in Mississippi in February 2018. Since then, proactive measures have been enacted for continued surveillance and management. Some measures include:

- Supplemental feeding of wildlife, including feeders, salt licks, and mineral licks, is banned within any MDWFP-defined CWD Management Zone.
- Only meat from cervids (deer, elk, moose, etc.) that has been completely deboned or bone-in quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached, hides with no head attached, finished taxidermy products, antlers with no tissue attached, and cleaned skulls or skull plates may be transported outside the CWD Zones or into Mississippi from any other state or country.
 Hunters may only transport a deer head outside of a MDWFP-defined CWD Management
- Hunters may only transport a deer head outside of a MDWFP-defined CWD Management Zone to a permitted taxidermist participating in the CWD collection program. A CWD sample number must be obtained from the participating taxidermist prior to transporting the deer head outside of the MDWFP-defined CWD Management Zone. This sample number must accompany the deer head while in transport and be available for inspection by Law Enforcement upon request. The deer head must be delivered to the participating taxidermist within 5 days of receiving the sample number.

MDWFP urges hunters to submit the heads of harvested deer for CWD sampling, especially if the deer was harvested in a CWD Zone.

LEGAL WEAPONS

Archery: Longbows, recurves, crossbows and compound bows. There is no minimum or maximum draw weight. There is no minimum arrow length. Fixed or mechanical broadheads may be used.

Primitive Weapons: Weapons legal for use during the Primitive Weapons season are all archery equipment and primitive firearms. "Primitive firearms," for the purpose of hunting deer, are defined as single- or double-barreled, muzzle-loading rifles of at least .38 caliber; OR singleshot, breech-loading, metallic-cartridge rifles (.35 caliber or larger) and replicas, reproductions, or reintroductions of those type rifles with an exposed hammer; OR single- or double-barreled, muzzle-loading shotguns, with single ball or slug. All muzzle-loading primitive firearms must use black powder or a black powder substitute with percussion caps, #209 shotgun primers, or flintlock ignition.

"Blackpowder substitute" is defined as a substance designed, manufactured, and specifically intended to be used as a propellant in muzzleloading or other black powder firearms, excluding modern smokeless powder. Metallic cartridges may be loaded with either black powder or modern smokeless powder (cartridges purchased at sporting goods stores).

During any open season on deer with primitive weapons after November 30, a person may use any legal weapon of choice including air bows and air guns (pre-charged pneumatic weapons) on private lands only, if the person is the title owner of the land; the lessee of the hunting rights on the land; a member of a hunting club leasing the hunting rights on the land; or a guest of a person specified above. If the person is required to have a hunting license, the person must have a primitive weapon license, Sportsman's License or a Lifetime Sportsman's License.

Gun: There are no caliber or magazine capacity restrictions on firearms. Archery and primitive firearms may be used during Gun seasons.

SUPPLEMENTAL FEEDING

Supplemental feeding of wildlife is allowed on private land in any county, or portion thereof, not in a CWD Management Zone. The feed may only be provided from above-ground, covered feeders or stationary spin-cast feeders. Any type of feed may be used. Feed may not be poured, piled, or placed directly on the ground. All feed and feeders must be at least 100 yards from the nearest property line. Deer hunters may hunt in the proximity, with no minimum distance, from a feeder as described above.

SPECIAL DEER HUNTS

Special primitive weapons deer hunts are established pursuant to the authority granted the Commission in Sections 49-7-37(2), (3), & (4), Mississippi Code of 1972. All archery and primitive weapons hunters must wear hunter orange while these special hunts are in effect.

ANTLERLESS PRIMITIVE WEAPONS HUNT

This season is for Antlerless Deer Only on private lands. Legal weapons are primitive weapons. This hunt is not on MDWFP Wildlife Management Areas. Refer to page 16 for the definition of a primitive weapon.

HUNTER ORANGE

When hunting deer during any firearm season, every hunter, whether hunting with a firearm, bow and arrow, or any weapon, must wear in full view at least five-hundred (500) square inches of solid unbroken fluorescent orange, except as otherwise provided in this section. Mesh-style or orange-camouflage is not considered unbroken and does not count toward the five hundred (500) square inch minimum.

Hunters shall not be required to wear five hundred (500) square inches of solid unbroken hunter orange when:

- 1. Hunting from a deer stand that is elevated twelve (12) feet or more above the ground; or
- 2. Hunting in a fully enclosed blind.


It is the intent of the Commission that "fully enclosed blinds" are tripod type stands, ladder stands, blinds and/or "shooting houses" or any other stand, whether located on the ground or elevated above ground, that can be covered so as to hide the hunter from view of game or other hunters.

FEDERAL LANDS-YOUTH HUNTS AND ANTLERLESS HARVEST

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers managed lands which designate the youth deer season in their regulations and open U.S. Forest Service National Forest lands are authorized to provide youth hunting opportunities.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and U.S. Army managed lands are authorized to harvest antlerless deer on days designated by Federal Regulations. Contact local National Wildlife Refuge, Corps of Engineers, or U.S. Army for details.



To participate in the Light Goose Conservation Order, hunters need a valid Mississippi hunting license, state waterfowl stamp, and a free Light Goose Conservation Order permit number. Hunters can obtain the permit number online at www.mdwfp.com/ waterfowl.

Light Goose Conservation Order Methods:

• Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

- Only snow, blue, and Ross's geese are eligible for harvest.
- The use of electronic calls is allowed.
- The use of unplugged shotguns is allowed.
- There is no daily or possession limit for snow, blue, or Ross's geese.
- Hunters must use non-toxic shot.

DAILY BAG LIMITS / POSSESSION LIMITS:
Possession Limit is three times the daily bag limit for all migratory game birds except on opening day unless otherwise noted.
Ducks - A total of 6 ducks, including no more than 4 mallards (no more than 2 of which may be females), 3 wood ducks, 2 redheads, 2 canvasbacks, 1 mottled duck, 2 black ducks, and 1 pintail. The daily bag limit for scaup is 1 scaup per day Nov. 24 - 26, Dec. 1 - 3, and Dec. 9 - 17; and is 2 scaup per day Dec. 18 - Jan. 31
Mergansers - A total of 5, only 2 of which may be hooded mergansers.
Coots - 15 Daily.

REPORTING YOUR TURKEY HARVESTS

By reporting your turkey harvests, you will aid the future of wild turkey conservation in Mississippi. Reporting through the MDWFP Game Check system is quick and easy, and it is MANDATORY for ALL TURKEY HUNTERS. The basics of Game Check are outlined below.

STEP 1. BEFORE YOU GO HUNTING

Obtain a hunting license (unless exempt) and harvest record. Two types of harvest records are acceptable, a digital record or a printed form. Digital record keeping may be done through the Game Check feature found within the free MDWFP app. Register in the app and it will be your official harvest record. If you prefer a printed form, the form below will suffice.

STEP 2. WHEN YOU HARVEST A TURKEY

The reporting process must begin BEFORE you move the turkey from its harvest location. Using the Game Check feature, click the REPORT TURKEY button and complete and submit an entry. If there is no cellular coverage where you hunt, the app will automatically upload your harvest when coverage resumes. Using the printed form method, notch the corresponding month bubbles.

STEP 3. AFTER YOU HUNT

Using the Game Check feature, you have no additional requirements. Using the printed form, you must report the harvest through the MDWFP website or by calling 1-800-BE-SMART before 10 p.m. on the day of harvest.

Once you complete the harvest-reporting process, you will receive a confirmation number. This number must be documented on the harvest record.

Wildlife Management Areas

The Wildlife Management Area (WMA) system is expansive and diverse. It includes 53 areas encompassing over a thousand square miles. WMAs are located from the upper edge of the coastal marshes in Jackson County to the lower reaches of the Appalachians in Tishomingo County. They range from the rolling hardwood hills of southwestern Mississippi to the deep, rich soils of the Delta. The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks owns some WMAs and manages many others under memoranda of understanding with the U.S. Forest Service or private corporations. Others are operated through longterm license agreements with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

When most Mississippians think of our WMAs, they think of them primarily as public hunting areas. Public hunting does, indeed, constitute the largest single use of WMAs. While deer hunting is the leading use, at over half of the annual total, there are many other resident and migratory game species available to pursue. Wild turkey, squirrel, rabbit, quail, raccoon, opossum, fox, and bobcat are among the resident species traditionally hunted on our WMAs. Ducks, geese, and doves are the most commonly hunted migratory species, but several other migratory game birds may be taken too. Wild hogs are classified as nuisance animals and hunters are encouraged to kill them at any lawful opportunity. Wild hogs may be killed during any open WMA hunting season with weapons and ammunition legal for that season.

Today's WMAs serve many other roles in addition to public hunting – fishing, primitive camping, wildlife viewing, photography, wildlife research, and nature study, to name a few. The common link among all WMAs is that they provide habitat for wildlife, game and nongame species alike. In certain locations they even lend themselves to management for threatened and endangered species such as the gopher tortoise, yellow-blotched sawback turtle, and red-cockaded woodpecker. The ability to enhance habitats and regulate public use makes WMAs vitally important for maintaining species of special concern.

Ŵhile our WMAs have something for almost everyone, they cannot be all things to all people. We are ultimately responsible for protecting the public's wildlife resources, so there must be limits on recreational opportunities we can offer. The ability to formulate regulations for specific areas allows us to offer controlled public use within the limits of these resources. Individual WMA brochures are available from the MDWFP at 1505 Eastover Drive, Jackson, MS 39211-6374, or online at www.mdwfp.com/wma, or the WMA.

NOTE: The MDWFP will assist handicapped users in locating easily accessible areas for hunting on all WMAs.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA PERMITTED DRAW HUNTS

Permitted draw hunts are used for a variety of species on WMAs to distribute hunting opportunity and pressure while providing higher quality, safer hunting experiences for the public.

To see a list of hunts that are currently open and to submit applications, please visit the WMA permitted draw hunt page at www.mdwfp.com/draws.

Annual application deadline targets are: Early Teal - August 15; Deer - August 31 and Turkey - February 15; Waterfowl -October 15. Typically, applications will be opened online approximately one month prior to the application deadlines.

Permitted hunt drawings are conducted within one week of the close of the application period. Selected hunters are notified by email or may check their status online at the WMA permitted draw hunt page link listed above.


Sam D. Hamilton Noxubee NWR/North Mississippi Refuges Complex (Coldwater, Dahomey and Tallahatchie National Wildlife Refuges) are open from sunrise to sunset. During hunting season, hunters may enter the refuge at 4:00 am and must exit the refuge no later than one hour after sunset.

Hunting and Fishing on the Sam D. Hamilton Noxubee NWR/North Mississippi Refuges Complex (NMRC) requires a \$15 North Mississippi National Wildlife Refuge Permit (Hunting/Fishing) if you are between the ages of 16-64. The permit can be purchased from any state license vendor or MDWFP website at http:// www.mdwfp.com/license/hunting-license.aspx

All hunters and anglers should read and follow the current Hunting and Fishing Regulations. Hunters are required to fill out/display on dash of vehicle a Harvest Data Card. Harvest Data Cards are available at all refuge kiosks.

The following activities are some of the prohibited activities please check the Hunting and Fishing brochure for a complete list:

- Use or possession of alcoholic beverages
 Use or possession of All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) or Utility Terrain Vehicles (UTVs)
- Fires, camping, littering
- Collecting, removing, or damaging any animal or plant, except for those authorized in the Hunting and Fishing Regulations
- All commercial activities including guiding hunts or participating in guided hunts on the Refuge

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Sharing Your Wildlife Management Areas and National Forests

The Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MDWFP) and the National Forests in Mississippi are committed to providing safe recreational experiences for all users. Growing demands for recreational trails, places to hunt, and other outdoor activities have resulted in increased use of wildlife management areas and National Forests. Interactions between recreational visitors are occurring more frequently. In response, the MD-WFP and National Forests in Mississippi are increasing efforts to raise individual awareness by providing tips to our visitors. Please follow these tips to ensure a safe visit for yourself and others and "Live to Play Another Day".

TIPS FOR TRAIL USERS

Trail Users: Know local hunting seasons—Specific dates for hunting seasons vary year-to-year and also by type of game hunted and the weapon used. Small-game seasons (dove, squirrel, rabbit, etc.) stretch from September through February. Deer seasons generally occur from October through January or mid-February. Turkey seasons usually run from mid-March through the beginning of May. Learn the regulations and hunting seasons for the areas where you will be recreating before you go. See www. mdwfp.com for specific information.

Trail Users:

- Know when hunting seasons are open
- Wear hunter orange during open seasons
- Make your presence known

Trail Users: Wear hunter orange—Wear a hunter orange hat and vest (and pack cover if backpacking), or hooded outerwear when out in fall, winter, and spring. Horse riders should make or buy brightly colored rump sheets for their horses.

Trail Users: Other clothing tips— Avoid wearing colors that could be mistaken for game animals—white or brown during deer seasons; red or blue during turkey seasons.

Trail Users: Be heard—Make sure you are heard before you are seen by whistling,

singing, talking, etc., while on a trail. Tie small bells to your stirrups.

Trail Users: Communicate—Conflicts between hunters and trail riders seem to be relatively rare. If you meet hunters tell them your planned route. Try to keep the communication open.

Trail Users: Avoid peak hunting times—Avoid riding at peak times such as the opening day of a particular hunting season or early mornings/late afternoons.

Trail Users: Try to avoid known hunting areas—If possible, use trails located outside of state WMAs during peak hunting periods.

TIPS FOR HUNTERS

Hunters: ID your target—Be sure of your target and what is in front of and beyond it. Before you pull the trigger you must properly identify game animals. Until your target is fully visible and in good light, do not even raise your scope to see it. Use binoculars!

Hunters: Don't shoot—Across roads, trails or waterways. These areas may be occupied by people.

Hunters: Avoid—Avoid alcohol and medications that may impair judgment before or while handling firearms.

Hunters: Educate yourself—Obey all the rules of firearm safety and insist that those around you do the same.

Hunters: Know where trails are—National Forest trail maps can be obtained at U.S. Forest Service ranger district offices. WMA maps located at WMA visitor permit stations include maps showing trails on the areas.

Hunters: Be alert for trail users and make your presence is known to them— Trail users may be unfamiliar with hunting. Trail users may not be aware of hunting seasons or that they are in or near areas open to hunting. Trail users may not be wearing hunter orange. Please use appropriate caution and communicate openly.

Hunting and Recreation on National Forests in Mississippi

The National Forests in Mississippi provide over 1 million acres of land available to the public for hunting. A variety of game is hunted each year on the National Forests in Mississippi. White-tailed deer, wild turkey, quail, squirrel, rabbit, raccoon, waterfowl, and more can be found in the forest.

The Forest Service shares responsibility for managing wildlife resources on national forest land with the MDWFP. This agency is responsible for regulating hunting seasons and enforcing game laws. The Forest Service, mainly through timber harvest, contributes to improved habitat conditions that benefit wildlife populations on the Forest.

DO I NEED A PERMIT TO HUNT ON NATIONAL FOREST LAND?

The requirements for hunting on national forest land in Mississippi include having a valid hunting license and following all rules and regulations set forth by the MDWFP.

Residents and Non-Residents that hunt, fish, or trap on Wildlife Management Areas on national forest land except those exempt from purchasing an annual hunting or fishing license, must purchase a Wildlife Management Area User Permit.

MAY I HUNT ANYWHERE ON NATIONAL FOREST LAND?

Most of the general forest area is open to hunting, but designated recreation areas and administrative sites are not. In addition, the Impact Closure Area of Camp Shelby on the DeSoto National Forest is closed to all public use. The area may be identified by signs that read "Danger, Military Firing Range, Unexploded Ordinance, DO NOT ENTER." Fourteen wildlife management areas are located on the National Forests in Mississippi that have special seasons and hunting regulations. These wildlife management areas are Bienville, Caney Creek, Caston Creek, Chickasaw, Chickasawhay, Choctaw, Leaf River, Little Biloxi, Mason Creek, Red Creek, Sandy Creek, Sunflower, Tallahala, and Upper Sardis. Be sure to review the regulations for hunting in these areas. All wildlife management area boundaries are posted with yellow signs. Check with the district offices for more information.

It is important to stay at least 150 yards from trails, roads, recreation areas, buildings, and residences. Pay close attention to the boundaries; what you may think is national forest land could be private. National forest land is marked with yellow signs in black print. These signs are posted along the boundaries.

Even though you may be within the national forest proclamation boundary, there are pockets of private land within that boundary. Abide by posted "No Hunting" and "No Trespassing" signs. Permission from private property owners must be obtained prior to hunting.

You may purchase forest maps, available at district offices or at the Supervisor's Office in Jackson, MS.

The hunting seasons set by the MDWFP for private land are the same for Mississippi's national forest land, except for special regulations which govern wildlife management areas, antlerless deer harvest, and youth hunting seasons.

OFF-ROAD VEHICLES/ATV AND GAME RETRIEVAL

ORVs/ATVs are allowed on designated roads or trails, and only for the retrieval of harvested deer or hogs without a weapon on all Forest Service-owned WMAs. On Sunflower WMA (Delta National Forest), anyone operating ORVs/ATVs should have a permit. Anyone operating ORVs/ATVs should be familiar with the Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM) published annually by the U.S. Forest Service. The MVUM explains when and where ORVs/ATVs may be used. MVUMs are available at the local Forest Service office and online at www. fs.usda.gov/main/mississippi/maps-pubs.

TREE STANDS AND BLINDS

Tree stands and blinds may be used on national forest land, but they must be portable and cannot be of a type that will deface or harm trees. Since national forest lands are open to public hunting, hunters cannot maintain exclusive rights to a hunting area. Wildlife Management Areas located on national forest land have specific regulations pertaining to tree stands and blinds. Please refer to MDWFP WMA Basic Rules for these regulations.

PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED HUNTER ACCESS

The Forest Service provides Universal Access to all persons and does not discriminate against able and unable bodied persons. Therefore, no lands are set aside for sole use by handicapped hunters.

BAITING

Baiting and hunting over baited areas to attract wildlife is not allowed on national forest lands. No food plots may be placed on national forest land except by official personnel.

CAMPING

Developed recreation areas offer conveniences such as showers, restrooms and picnic facilities. Primitive camping is allowed except in designated scenic areas or where otherwise prohibited. During hunting season, camping is permitted only in designated hunter camps in Sunflower WMA (Delta National Forest), and Choctaw and Chickasaw WMAs (Tombigbee National Forest). Camping in the national forests is limited to 14 days during a 30-day time period. Camps may not be left unattended for a period no longer than twentyfour (24) hours. Contact ranger offices for more information on camp locations.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE NATIONAL FOREST LAND

The land shown in green on the maps indicates national forest land.

Red paint and signs mark the boundaries between national forest land and private property. Recognition of these markings and boundary signs helps the visitor to be certain to stay on national forest land.

Visitors should comply with state law and the owner's rules when entering private land.

Entrance (portal) signs can be seen along major roads entering the national forests, usually on the first tract of government land encountered. Generally, portal signs are not used on low traffic roads.

Welcome signs are located on or just inside the boundaries or individual tracts of national forest land where the road enters. The sign will be oriented so that the land behind the sign is public land. Generally, they are not used on dead-end or woods roads or on small blocks of public land.

Upon entering woods on public land, welcome signs will not be present and the visitor should rely on property line markings and boundary signs.

The boundaries of individual national forest tracts adjacent to other ownerships are marked with brown and yellow property boundary signs.

The small metal boundary signs are fastened either to trees or posts located on the boundary line and at road crossings, and the signs are placed so that public land is behind the sign. Red paint spots on trees define the boundary line through woods.

While the majority of boundaries are identified and posted, occasionally visitors may encounter an area where signs have been vandalized or lines are not marked. In these cases, visitors should be alert to avoid accidentally trespassing on private land.

KNOW THE RULES

The regulations for legal species, weapons, season dates and bag limits are issued by the MDWFP. The rules in this guide are general in scope. More detailed, local rules and regulations may be obtained from the district ranger's office.

Turkey Tagging Coming in Spring 2025

ississippi turkey hunters must attach harvest tags to all legally taken wild turkeys beginning in the 2025 spring season.

While the process will be new to many Mississippians, it should be familiar to those who have spent much time hunting out of state; nearly three-quarters of states with huntable turkey populations require some form of tagging. This new responsibility will address hunters' concerns by ensuring greater compliance with bag limits and existing harvest reporting requirements.

Acquisition of turkey tags will be straightforward and required of all hunters, regardless of license exemption status. Tags may be acquired through any avenue used to purchase a hunting license. If done online or via the Mississippi Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks' (MDWFP) mobile app, tags will be shipped directly to you. Alternatively, they will be able to be printed directly by any point-of-sale license vendor.

Utilizing tagging as a conservation and management tool will allow hunters and the MDWFP to protect the wild turkey resource more effectively for future generations! For more information, visit www. mdwfp.com/turkey.

WMA CHANGES

The Commission for Mississippi Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks approved the creation of Calling Panther Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Copiah County at its May meeting. The newest WMA will have permitted turkey hunts, permitted archery hunts, and squirrel hunts (squirrel hunts will be in February only).

The deer hunts are archery-only and take place from Sept. 30 through Jan. 31. Hunters will submit applications in a random drawing and will be drawn for the Thursday-Sunday hunts. The application period for draw hunts is the same as it will be for all WMAs (Aug. 1-31).

Turkey hunts will take place on weekends during the statewide season and are youth-only. Two hunters will be drawn for each hunt. The application period is Jan. 15-Feb. 15.

Name changes to two other WMAs also were approved:

- Tuscumbia WMA to Harvey Moss WMA at Tuscumbia
- Caney Creek WMA to Richard L. "Dick" Livingston and Dale O. Windham WMA at Caney Creek

ELECTRIC BIKES

Electric bicycles (E-bikes) are becoming increasingly popular for recreational use on trails and parks. However, it is important to note that each park has its own rules and regulations regarding electric bicycles. On most WMAs, E-bikes can be used on designated ATV trails. Off-road use is allowed only for the retrieval of harvested deer and hogs. On WMAs where electric bicycles are allowed, these bikes now can be ridden on marked foot-traffic trails only by users 65 and older. Considered a motorized vehicle, similar to ATVs, Ebikes with a cart on the back have been helpful with game retrieval for senior adults. Ebikes still may not be ridden on any leveed roads or trails.

TUPELO OFFICE

MDWFP has reopened its office at Elvis Presley Lake in Tupelo. The office is fully staffed with MDWFP employees and open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Friday. In addition to staffing from Wildlife, Fisheries, and Law Enforcement bureaus, there will also be a point-of-sale system in place where the public can purchase their licenses and permits and renew their boat registrations. Elvis Presley Lake and the adjacent campground will remain closed while undergoing renovations. For more information, please call (662) 840-5172.



USDA NFS Order for National Forests in Mississippi (effective through Feb. 1, 2026)

This order (No. 08-11-37-23-152) is applicable to all National Forests in Mississippi, which include Bienville, Delta, DeSoto, Holly Springs, Homochitto, and Tombigbee.

The following is prohibited:

- Possessing or consuming alcohol while in possession of a loaded firearm, air rifle, gas gun, or any instrument that can discharge a projectile that can cause death, injury, or property damage.
- Possessing a loaded firearm, air rifle, gas gun, or any instrument that can discharge a projectile that can cause death, injury, or property damage while driving under the influence of alcohol or other impairing substance.
- Transporting an uncased shoulder-fired firearm, air rifle, or gas gun in a motor vehicle on a National Forest Service (NFS) road or trail, except for off-highway vehicles (OHV).
- Operating or being on an OHV on an NFS road or trail with a loaded shoulder-fired firearm, air rifle, or gas gun.
- Using shoulder-fired weapons within 100 feet of the center line of any road or trail designated for motor vehicle traffic.
- Hunting with dogs during any firearm season without wearing a minimum of 500 square inches of solid unbroken fluorescent orange in full view.



- Hunting quail or rabbits without wearing a solid hunter orange vest or cap.
- Discharging a projectile that can cause death, injury, or property damage across a National Forest property line into non-NFS land.

Violation of these prohibitions is punishable by a fine of not more than \$5,000 for an individual and \$10,000 for an organization, or imprisonment of not more than six months, or both.

General Hunting Regulations and Requirements

Landowner permission is required to hunt, fish, or trap on private lands. MD-WFP Wildlife Management Areas are subject to special seasons and regulations which may vary from statewide seasons and regulations. Contact the MDWFP or area personnel (see page 22) for information about these areas.

LICENSE AND HUNTER EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

For information on license requirements, license exemptions, and hunter education requirements, see "License Information" on pages 8-12.



UNLAWFUL PURCHASE OF LICENSE

Any person who obtains a license under an assumed name or makes a materially false statement to obtain a license is guilty of a felony and shall be subject to a fine of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) and/or can be imprisoned for a term of one (1) year.

SHOOTING HOURS

Legal shooting hours for resident game are one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to one-half (1/2) hour after sunset. Legal shooting hours for migratory birds are one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset.

LEGAL GAME

For description of legal bucks, see Whitetailed Deer Management Units on page 15. Raccoon, fox, opossum, beaver, nutria, coyotes, and bobcats may be legally hunted at night, with or without the use of a light and with dogs, except during the spring turkey season. Hunters may hunt raccoon with dogs during the spring turkey season with a permit issued from MDWFP. These permits may be obtained online at mdwfp.com.

Landowners, leaseholders, or their designated agents may take nuisance animals year-round on lands owned or leased by them. Beaver, coyotes, nutria, fox, skunk, and wild hogs are classified as nuisance species and can be taken year round by licensed hunters subject to applicable regulations (see MDWFP Rule 7.1).

WEAPONS AND LOADS

Legal weapons for hunting from one-half (1/2) hour after sunset to one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise are restricted to handguns or rifles using no larger than .22 standard rimfire cartridges (no .22 magnums) and shotguns with shot no larger than No. 6.

When hunting migratory birds, a shotgun must be "plugged" so that it can hold no more than three (3) shells at one loading.

Legal weapons to hunt spring turkey are restricted to shotguns with no larger than No. 2 shot and compound, recurve, or long bows. However, any quadriplegic may hunt with a rifle.

DECOYS AND BAIT

It is illegal to hunt any wild animal or wild bird with the aid of live decoys or bait. Liquid scents may be used. Electrically operated calling or sound-reproducing devices may be used for hunting crow and nuisance animals. See MDWFP Rule 7.1 for information on baiting of nuisance animals.

HUNTING DOGS

Running of dogs during spring turkey season is allowed only by the exceptions designated in MDWFP Rule 5.3. Dogs are not allowed for hunting deer during archery season, primitive weapon seasons, or still hunting season. Application for dog field trials must be made to MDWFP at least 5 working days before the opening of the trial.

MEANING OF "UNLOADED"

"Unloaded" means that a cartridge or shell is not positioned in the barrel or magazine of the firearm or in a clip, magazine, or retainer attached to the firearm; or in the case of a caplock muzzle-loading firearm,"unloaded" means that the cap has been removed; or in the case of a flintlock muzzle-loading firearm, "unloaded" means that all powder has been removed from the flashpan.

HUNTING FROM ROADS, VEHICLES, AND BOATS

It is unlawful to hunt or shoot in, on, or across any street, public road, public highway, railroad, or the rights-of-way.

RULE 1.4 HUNTING FROM A MOTORIZED VEHICLE

A. It is unlawful to shoot at any wild animal, or wild bird from a motorized vehicle or motorized conveyance unless the progress from such vehicle or conveyance has completely ceased.

B. It is unlawful to hunt, chase, take, or pursue any wild animal other than squirrels and beaver from a motorboat or other watercraft having a motor, unless the motor has been completely shut off and its progress has ceased.

C. It is unlawful to discharge any firearm from a boat or other watercraft operating on the public waters of this state during night-time hours from 30 minutes after sunset until 30 minutes before sunrise; except the Commission may set special seasons and regulations for the taking of alligators at night during dates and times set by them.

ANIMAL CONTROL PERMITS

Animal Control Permits may be issued to scare, harass, and/or kill deer that are destroying crops only after an MDWFP officer has inspected the damage and requested the issuance of such permits. To request an officer to inspect your damage, contact the appropriate regional office. Regional office phone numbers can be found on page 22.

KILLING DEER OUT OF SEASON

If a person is convicted of killing any deer out of season, that person may be fined not less than \$100 and his license may be revoked for a year by the Commission on Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks.

HEADLIGHTING

It is unlawful to hunt, take or kill a deer at night with the aid of a light, lighting device, light amplifying device, forwardlooking infrared (FLIR) or thermal imaging device. Headlighting Deer is a Class I violation that is punishable upon conviction of a \$2000-\$5000 fine and forfeiture of all hunting, fishing and trapping privileges for one to three years.

Any equipment used to hunt or kill deer at night that is subject to seizure is considered

contraband property and will be seized by the enforcement officer. This equipment is subject to forfeiture and may become the property of the State of Mississippi.

HARASSMENT OF WILDLIFE

It is unlawful to shine a light from a public road or right-of-way, or on the property of another, at night, from one-half (1/2) hour after sunset to on-half (1/2) hour before sunrise. Harassment of Wildlife is a Class 2 violation that is punishable upon conviction of a \$100-\$500 fine.

RETRIEVAL OF WOUNDED DEER AFTER LEGAL HUNTING HOURS

It shall be lawful for any licensed or exempt hunter or tracker to track or pursue a deer that was legally shot and wounded during legal hunting hours, into the night after legal hunting hours, and to dispatch the deer if the deer is found alive. A licensed or exempt hunter or tracker tracking or pursuing a wounded deer into the nighttime hours may use reasonable means to assist the pursuit, including, but not limited to lights, and blood-trailing/ tracking dogs. If blood-trailing/tracking dogs are used, no more than two (2) dogs may be used. If the deer being tracked is discovered alive, but wounded, the hunter or tracker may dispatch the deer by using a handgun with a barrel no longer than six (6) inches chambered in a caliber no larger than .45 caliber.

TRANSPORTING GAME

Any game animal, bird, or fish lawfully taken may be possessed at any time.

LITTERING

It is unlawful to throw, dump or otherwise dispose of any dead wildlife, wildlife parts, or waste on roads, rights-of-way of such roads, highways, or upon any private property without the permission of the owner of such property.

SELLING OF ANIMALS NATIVE TO MISSISSIPPI

It is unlawful to buy, sell, offer for sale, or exchange for merchandise or other consideration, any game animal, game bird, or game fish (regardless of whether it was taken in or out of Mississippi), except as follows: The skins and sinew of legally taken deer can be bought or sold at any time, products crafted or made from deer bone or antlers not in velvet can be sold, any part of a wild turkey, except the meat, may be bought or sold, and any parts of nuisance animals may be bought or sold. The meat of wild hogs may only be sold upon inspection per regulation of the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce. The carcasses of raccoons, opossums, and muskrats may be sold for food during the open trapping season, and for 30 days after the close of trapping season. It also is illegal to buy or sell any non-game wildlife native to Mississippi, or any mounted game animals, game birds, or game fish.

PROTECTED WILDLIFE

Protected Wildlife are species that may not be hunted, molested, bought, or sold. All birds of prey (eagles, hawks, osprey, owls, kites, and vultures) and other native non-game birds are considered Protected Wildlife. Additionally, all species receiving protection under the Federal Endangered Species Act and/or Mississippi's Endangered Species Act are Protected Wildlife. Some of these species are more likely than others to be encountered by Mississippi hunters in the field: black bear, gopher tortoise, and sawback turtles (black knobbed, ringed, and yellow blotched) are examples. A full list of federal and/ or state-endangered species occurring in Mississippi can be found by navigating to www.mdwfp.com/museum/seek-study/ natural-heritage-program/ and clicking on "endangered species."

MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS

Any person 16 years of age and older must have both a federal waterfowl stamp (or temporary proof of electronic purchase) and a state waterfowl stamp (or proof of electronic purchase) in order to hunt migratory waterfowl (ducks and geese). If a physical stamp is in possession, it must be signed by the hunter across the face of the stamp. Exempt landowners and hunters over the age of 65 also must have these stamps when hunting waterfowl. Dove, rail, gallinule, coot, woodcock, crows, and snipe are not classified as waterfowl and may be hunted without such stamps.

All licensed hunters hunting migratory game birds (dove, rail, gallinule, coot, woodcock, snipe, crows, and waterfowl (ducks and geese) must be H.I.P. (Harvest Information Program) certified. H.I.P. certified means taking the Migratory Bird Survey at time of license purchase or separately.

TRAPPING

Trappers must have permission to trap on any land other than their own. A trapping license is required of anyone 16 years of age or older who traps fur-bearing and nuisance animals on property other than their own. A trapping license is also required of each assistant or helper 16 years of age or older employed or used by a trapper. Trappers are required to have an identification number, which is registered with MDWFP, attached to ALL traps by a metal tag or permanently inscribed, etched, or stamped on the trap. Any trap found without a registered identification number will be in violation and subject to removal by a conservation officer.

It shall be unlawful for any person to disturb the traps of another or to take furbearing/nuisance animals from them unless authorized by the owner. A trapping license is required to sell the pelts and/or skins of nuisance animals and furbearers, and may be sold only during the trapping season and for 30 days thereafter. All traps must be attended at least once every 36-hour period.

No traps may be placed on or set within 100 feet of any street or public road. Except, a municipality or county, or any person who has contracted with a municipality or county, may place or set only snare traps within one hundred (100) feet of any road or street located within such municipality or county. The governing authority of the municipality or the board of supervisors of the county shall make a finding that such placement of snare traps is reasonable and necessary to protect the public safety by removing fur-bearing and nuisance animals that threaten the safety of public roads and bridges. Snares shall be submerged at least fifty percent (50%). Additionally, landowners may trap on their own land within 100 feet of a public road, but not within the maintained road rightof-way.

No body-gripping (conibear-type) traps that exceed 7 inches inside jaw spread may be set on any public lands unless submerged in water.

Licensed trappers may maintain raw fur, green pelts, or dried fur in storage at any time. Anyone transporting raw fur or green pelts from 11 days after the close of trapping season until the day before the opening of trapping season must tag and identify such fur and pelts with the date, county of harvest, and person who trapped them.

It is illegal to trap with the aid of bait, recordings of bird or animal calls, or electrically amplified imitations of calls of any kind. Except, lure is allowed for trapping furbearers, beaver, nutria, coyote, skunk, and fox, provided that no more than two and one-half (2.5) cubic inches of such lure may be placed or located within twenty (20) feet of any trap. The lure amount of 2.5 cubic inches is approximately the volume equivalent of a regulation-sized golfball. All lure within twenty (20) feet of any trap must be covered and not visible from above. However, there are no lure restrictions when used inside live-cage type traps that do not exceed forty-two (42) inches in length, fifteen (15) inches in width, and twenty (20) inches in height. Liquid scents may be used.

The carcasses of raccoons, muskrats, and opossums may be sold for food during the open trapping season and for thirty (30) days after the close of trapping season. The holder of an All Game License, Sportsman License, or Trapping License may sell any part of any nuisance animal year-round.

TAGGING OF OTTER AND BOBCAT

Federal regulations, which require tagging to account for harvest of bobcat and river otter, are in effect. The Commission requires the tagging of otter and bobcat, to account for harvest of these species, which are subject to federal export regulations (CITES Tags). Bobcat and river otter harvested in Mississippi must be CITES tagged prior to shipping or transporting out of Mississippi. It is not required to present the carcass or pelt to the MDWFP in order to purchase CITES tags.

CITES tags (via over-the-counter purchases) are only available for purchase from November 1 - April 15 at the following MDWFP locations: Jackson Office, North Region Office, Central Region Office, South Region Office, Buccaneer State Park, Clarkco State Park, Hugh White State Park, Clarkco State Park, Hugh White State Park, J. P. Coleman State Park, John Kyle State Park, Legion State Park, Leroy Percy State Park, Natchez State Park, and Paul B. Johnson State Park. Tags are sold in lots of five each for \$1.29 only at the above listed locations. Quantities at each location may be limited, therefore, it is recommended to call in advance.

CITES tags are no longer available by mail-in requests.

ALLIGATOR HUNTING PERMITS

Alligator hunting in Mississippi is allowed by special permit only. There are separate seasons for public waters and private lands. Each alligator permit allows the harvest of two alligators 4 feet long or longer, but only one may exceed 7 feet long. The MDWFP issues harvest tags to each permittee and harvest reporting is mandatory.

Public Water Permits - A limited number of public water permits are offered each year. (A random drawing will be conducted by a third-party entity for all available permits in each of the seven alligator hunting zones. To be entered into the drawing, qualified applicants must submit an application electronically between June 1-8. The application is free but there will be a processing fee charged. There are seven zones and customers are limited to one application in a zone of their choice.). To qualify for a permit you must be 16 years of age or older and possess one of the following prior to June 1: a valid Mississippi Sportsman License, All Game Hunting/Fishing License, Small Game Hunting/Fishing License, Apprentice Sportsman License, Apprentice All Game License, Apprentice Small Game License, Senior Exempt License, Disabled Exempt License, or Lifetime License. Winning applicants will be notified via email on or about June 14. A link will be provided to purchase the alligator permit and license. Winners will have a deadline to purchase their permit. Upon the deadline, a second drawing of the remaining undrawn applicants will take place to fulfill any deficits of available unpurchased permits. An online Alligator Hunting Training Course is available at www.mdwfp.com/alligator. An Alligator Hunting License is \$25 and an Alligator Possession Permit is \$200. Any hunting party guests 16 years of age and older must possess a valid Alligator Hunting License and an All Game Hunting License. Lifetime License holders are exempt from the Alligator Hunting License. Hunter education requirements for licenses do apply. For more specific regulations and application procedures, visit www.mdwfp. com/alligator.

Private Lands Permits – There are 36 counties open to private lands permits. To be eligible, properties in open counties must contain at least 20 acres of privately owned permanent surface water. One harvest permit voucher is issued for properties with at least 20 acres of eligible water and one additional voucher for each additional 100 acres of eligible water. Applications are available at www.mdwfp.com/alligator. Applications are submitted in June and the deadline for submission is July 1. Only one application may be submitted per property. Applicants may be residents or non-residents 16 years of age or older. Applicants must provide signed permission from the landowner, copies of property tax receipts, property deed and legal description, and a property boundary map. An online Alligator Hunting Training Course is available at www.mdwfp.com/alligator. License requirements for drawn applicants are an Alligator Hunting License (\$25) and an Alligator Possession Permit (Resident-\$100, Non-resident \$200), as well as an All Game Hunting License. Any hunting party guests 16 years of age and older must purchase an Alligator Hunting License and an All Game Hunting License. Lifetime License holders are exempt from the Alligator Hunting License. Hunter education requirements for licenses do apply. For more specific regulations and application procedures, visit www.mdwfp.com/alligator.

Mississippi's Hunter Education Program

HUNTER EDUCATION WORKS

Since 1950 when formal hunter safety programs were introduced, the number of hunting and firearms-related accidents has declined dramatically. In Mississippi, we know that our hunter education efforts have reduced firearms accidents and saved lives. MDWFP offers the hunter education classes at numerous locations across the state, and the course includes ten (10) hours of instruction. Students must be at least 10 years old, must attend all course hours, and score 70 or greater on the written exam.

Hunter Education Courses are typically held in the late summer, fall, and winter months. Courses are taught by MDWFP staff or by certified volunteer instructors. Pre-registration for all Hunter Education Classes is required. To locate and register for a class, visit our website at education. mdwfp.com.

Hunter Education Courses are also offered online. As of July 31, 2020, Mississippi residents age 12 and over can complete their hunter education requirement online. The internet course, *Today's Hunter in Mississippi*, is video-narrated and interactive. The card from the online course can be presented as a digital or paper copy to license vendors to purchase a hunting license.

All residents under 12 (ages 10-11) and non-residents can obtain their Hunter Education requirement through a classroom course. Students must pre-register for the class, click the following link https://education.mdwfp.com/Web/Event/County-Selection.




Boating Enforcement

PERSONAL FLOATATION DEVICES

- All vessels must carry one wearable U. S. Coast Guard approved personal floatation device (PFD) or life jacket for each person on board.
- All PFDs must be:
 - » in good and serviceable condition;
 - » readily accessible which means you are able to put the PFD on quickly in an emergency;
 - » of the proper size for the intended wearer. Sizing for PFDs is based on body weight and chest size.
- All vessels 16 feet length or longer must also have one U.S. Coast Guard approved throwable PFD (throwable) on board and it must be readily accessible.
- Children 12 years old and younger must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved PFD whenever in a vessel less than 26 feet in length that is underway.
- Each person riding on or being towed behind a personal watercraft must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved PFD.

ALCOHOL BOATING SAFETY

The Alcohol Boating Safety Act makes it unlawful to operate a watercraft on the public waters of the State of Mississippi while



under the influence of intoxicating liquor or any other substance which has impaired the person's ability to operate a watercraft.

- a. As a condition of operating a watercraft on the public waters of this state, the person operating the watercraft is deemed to have given consent to testing for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of his blood.
- b. "Watercraft" is defined as any motorized vessel with a motor of 25 horsepower or greater used for transportation on public waters, and any personal watercraft (jet skis).
- c. "Public waters" is defined as all public waters over which the State of Mississippi has jurisdiction.
- d. Penalties for conviction under this law are:
 - 1. **First conviction** Fine no less than \$250 nor more than \$1,000, or imprisonment in jail for not more than twenty-four hours or both. Violator must complete a boating safety course.
 - Second conviction (within a fiveyear period) - Fine no less than \$600 nor more than \$1,000 and imprisonment not less than forty-eight consecutive hours nor more than one year of community service work for not less than ten days nor more than one year. Court shall order violator not to operate a watercraft for one year.
 - 3. Third conviction (within a five-year period) Fine no less than \$800 nor more than \$1,000; and imprisonment not less than thirty days nor more than one year. Court shall order violator not to operate a watercraft for two years.
 - 4. Conviction of a fourth or subsequent violation (within a five-year period) is a FELONY OFFENSE. Fine no less than \$2,000 nor more than \$5,000; and imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than ninety days nor more than five years. Court shall order violator not to operate a watercraft for three years.

BOATING SAFETY COURSE

Any person born after June 30, 1980 must have successfully completed a Boating Safety Course prior to operating a boat. Persons under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a person 21 or older on board the boat in order to operate the boat.

Boater Education Courses are typically held in the spring and summer months. Courses are taught by MDWFP staff or by certified volunteer instructors.

Pre-registration for all Boater Education Classes is required. To locate and register for a class, visit our website at education. mdwfp.com. Online courses are available at www.mdwfp.com. Most insurance companies honor these courses by offering reductions in insurance premiums on completion. Boating Safety Courses are only required for operating motorized vessels.

BOATING CHECK LIST

Before you go out on the water, the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks would like to make you aware of everything you need to know for an enjoyable and safe boating experience. The following is a boating check list that will guide you to an enjoyable boating experience.

- Valid boating registration (onboard vessel)
- Valid numbers displayed on side of vessel (At least 3 inches tall with contrasting colors to hull).
- Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Device sized to fit, for every person on board.
- Vessel 16' or larger must have a Coast Guard approved throwable device.
- Vessel must have a fire extinguisher if it has an enclosed gas compartment.
- Vessel must have a sound device if operating on navigable waters.
- Anyone 12 years and younger must wear a Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Device at all times while the vessel is underway.
- Boater Education/Safety card for all operators who were born on or after June 30, 1980.

BOAT REGISTRATION

In Mississippi, all boats equipped with propulsion machinery and sailboats (anchored or not) which use the public waters of the state must be registered and numbered for identification. A person must register his/her boat no later than 10 days after the actual purchase. All boat registrations are valid for a period of three years from the last day of the month of receipt of the original or transfer application. You must have your registration card on board the vessel at all times.

Due to the increase in marine theft, a closer look is being taken at applications for boat registration when received. Applications for boat registration with required information missing or information which appears to be incorrect will be returned. The applicant will be required to have their boat inspected by a conservation officer. A "Boat Inspection Request Form" can be purchased through point-of-sale license agents and an inspection will be arranged with an officer in the area. The cost of the inspection is \$10.00 (plus transaction fee). The application should then be resubmitted along with the completed boat inspection form. All homemade boats will require an inspection prior to registration.

HOW TO APPLY FOR REGISTRATION OF A BOAT

Owners of new or used boats have the option to register their boat Online or at the Jackson office. Owners may register their boat online at www.mdwfp.com. Owners may get the boat registration form at any local county tax collector's office, most places where boats are sold or serviced, MDWFP Regional Offices, or online at www.mdwfp.com. Complete the form, attach any necessary documents, sign and mail to the Jackson Office with the appropriate fee.

To register a new boat, if purchased from a dealer, the sales invoice showing proof of payment of Mississippi sales tax must be included. If the boat was purchased in another state you may pay Mississippi state sales tax at the local county tax collector's office. Include this proof of payment with the registration **application.** If registering or transferring ownership of a used boat you must include a notarized or witnessed bill of sale describing the boat being purchased. You must also provide proof of the last registered owner of the used boat. If a boat was previously registered and titled in a state that requires mandatory titling you must also include the previous state's registration and title.


The registration application requires a Hull Identification Number or serial number. This number should contain 12 digits if the boat was manufactured after November, 1972. Examples of proper 12 digit Hull Identification Numbers will be: ABC456781272 or ABC45678A484. Boats manufactured prior to 1972 will have a serial number.

HOW TO RENEW A BOAT REGISTRATION

Once a boat is registered, a notice to renew the registration will be mailed to the owner by the MDWFP. For convenience and faster service you may renew your boat registration wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold, by calling 1-800-5GO-HUNT (1-800-546-4868) which is available 24 hours a day, or online at

ASSIGNMENT OF REGISTRATION NUMBER

After processing a new boat registration, the department will assign a registration number to be displayed on the boat. This number is also noted on a water-resistant, pocket-sized boat registration card which is mailed to the owner. This card must be aboard the boat when in operation. Boat owners also will receive two validating decals. The decals should be displayed within six inches (6") of the number (See Boat Registration Numbering System and Proper Display). The decals correlate with the year the boat registration will expire. The registration number assigned by MDWFP for a boat becomes a permanent number. That registration number will remain the same in the event that the boat is transferred to a new owner within the state of Mississippi.

BOAT REGISTRATION NUMBERING SYSTEM & PROPER DISPLAY

The numbering system consists of three parts: the first part consists of the symbol MI, which designates Mississippi; the second part consists of a numerical group having a maximum of four digits; and the third part consists of an alphabetical group having a maximum of two letters. Each part shall be separated by hyphens or equivalent spaces.

The assigned number shall be painted on or attached to each side of the bow of the vessel for which it was issued. The numbers shall be placed on each side of the forward half of the vessel in such position as to provide clear legibility for identification.

The numbers shall read from left to right and shall be in block characters of good proportion not less than three inches (3") in height. The numbers shall be of a color which will contrast with the color of the background and be maintained to be clearly visible and legible, i.e., dark numbers on a light background, or light numbers on a dark background. No other numbers shall be carried on the bow of such vessel.

SOLD OR LOST/STOLEN BOATS

Should you sell your boat, you are required to report such transaction to MDWFP, which issues the registration number. The new owner must, within ten (10) days, make application to transfer the registration. If a numbered boat is lost, stolen or abandoned, the owner should first report it to the local authorities having jurisdiction, and then report it to MDWFP.

BOAT & MOTOR TITLING

Boat and outboard motor titling is available in Mississippi but is not mandatory. Boat and motor titling is an optional choice for lending institutions and boat owners. The cost is \$12.70 each for an original title, duplicate title, or corrected title. A boat must be registered before being titled. If the title is submitted indicating a lien, the original title will be sent to the lending institution until the lien is satisfied. Once the lien is satisfied, an original clear title will be provided to the owner. When a titled boat is sold, the owner must provide the original title to the purchaser along with a bill of sale in order for the boat to be eligible for transfer of ownership. Boat and Motor title applications may be obtained online at www.mdwfp.com, through your lending institution or from MDWFP Boat Registration Department.

FRESHWATER SPORT FISHING

MDWFP manages all public freshwater fish populations north of Hwy 90. This includes public reservoirs, 19 state fishing lakes, 19 state park lakes and 20 community fishing assistance ponds. A freshwater fishing license is required to fish in public waters north of Interstate 10. Review the digest's license section for requirements or call (601) 432-2055. Go to <u>www.mdwfp.com</u> for weekly fishing reports from February through November.

FRESHWATER GUIDES & OUTFITTERS

Freshwater Fishing Guides and Outfitters are required to purchase a Fishing Guide License and a Guide Boat License. See the license section.

FREE FISHING DAYS

On June 1 - 2, 2024, during National Fishing and Boating Week, a sport fishing license is not required for Mississippi residents for all public waters, and fishing permits for all anglers at State Lakes and State Park Lakes are free! Mississippi residents can fish without a fishing license on July 4th in all waters of the state. State Fishing Lake and State Park Permits are required to fish in State Fishing Lakes and State Park Lakes on July 4.

SALTWATER FISHING

Saltwater fisheries and public fishing south of Hwy 90 are managed by the Mississippi Department of Marine Resources. For information concerning saltwater fishing, please call (228) 374-5000 or go to www. dmr.ms.gov. A saltwater fishing license is required to fish all waters south of Hwy 90.

On all public waters south of Interstate 10 and north of Hwy 90 either a

freshwater fishing license or a saltwater fishing license is valid for use.

PUBLIC ACCESS

Many public waters in the state are located on or near private land. These waters must be accessed through a public access point or by permission from the landowner. Contact MDWFP if you have questions about access to fishing waters and for public access points.

GAME FISH

Game fish are defined as: bream (redear sunfish, bluegill, longear sunfish, warmouth, green sunfish), crappie (white, black), black bass (largemouth, smallmouth, spotted) shadow bass, walleye, sauger, yellow perch, hybrid striped bass, striped bass, white bass, yellow bass, and pickerel (redfin, grass, and chain).

NON-GAME GROSS FISH

Non-game gross fish are defined as: gizzard shad, threadfin shad, gar (alligator, shortnose, longnose, spotted), eel, bowfin, common carp, paddlefish, bullheads (yellow, black, brown), buffalo (smallmouth, bigmouth, and black), spotted sucker, river carpsucker, quillback, highfin carpsucker, blacktail redhorse, freshwater drum, and catfish (channel, blue, flathead).

LEGAL SPORT FISHING METHODS

Hook and Line: Game fish may be taken by hook and line (one or more hooks, including rod and reel with artificial bait). You may actively fish with an unlimited number of poles or rod/reels except on waters where the number of poles or rod/ reels is restricted. Check the Special Regulations Section for specific restrictions.

Bow & Arrow, Crossbow, Spear, or Gig are allowed for the harvest of the following: bowfin, buffalo, common carp, catfish, gar, shad, silver carp, bighead carp, black carp, grass carp, and snakehead. Only carp, gar, buffalo, and bowfin may be taken by bow and arrow at night at State Fishing Lakes and State Park Lakes. Catfish may not be taken with spear or gig from May 1 through July 15. No other species of fish may be harvested with these gears.

Snagging: Snagging is when fish are intentionally hooked in any place other than the mouth. Snagging is allowed statewide the entire year for all game fish and non-game gross fish. Any size hook may be used when snagging except when fishing in spillways. See spillway restrictions.

Trotlines, Throwlines, Limblines and/ or Set Hooks are allowed for the harvest of game fish and non-game gross fish. No more than a total of 100 single hooks may be fished. Hooks must be tied securely at least 2 feet apart. The Mississippi Department of Marine Resources regulates trotline use in the waters south of Interstate 10. Anglers should call (228) 374-5000 to learn about fishing trotlines in these waters.

HOOK LIMIT

Each person having a valid sport fishing license may use no more than 100 hooks per person.

Free Floating Fishing Devices (FFFD), Jugs, and Yo-Yos: No more than 25 jugs and no more than 25 yo-yos may be fished by an individual with no more than 2 single hooks on each of these devices. If these devices are attached to a line, they must be tied securely at least 2 feet apart. See State Border Waters section for legal number allowed in those areas. These gears do not need to be attended or tagged unless you are fishing in the following waters:

- 1. Arkabutla Reservoir in Tate and Desoto counties
- 2. Eagle Lake in Warren County

- 3. Enid Reservoir in Lafayette, Panola, and Yalobusha counties
- 4. Grenada Reservoir in Grenada, Calhoun, and Yalobusha counties
- 5. Lake Washington in Washington County
- 6. Sardis Reservoir in Panola, Marshall, and Lafayette counties

In these waters, attended means devices (whether set, baited, or tripped) must remain within sight of the angler during daylight hours. These devices may be fished at night without attendance except at Lake Washington where attendance at night is required. At Lake Washington, yo-yos may only be unattended (tripped, with hook out of the water) from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Unattended yo-yos fishing during the day at the waters listed above and fishing at night at Lake Washington may be seized by MD-WFP Law Enforcement officers except for those fishing unattended at Lake Washington from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. In these waters, all gear must be legibly marked with a tag. The tags shall be furnished by the angler and must contain either the license holder's MDWFP number or the full name, residence address, and zip code of any angler exempt from purchasing a license. This information must be legibly written with either waterproof ink or stamped. Yo-yo tags shall be attached above the water line.

CRAWFISH AND FRESHWATER SHRIMP

A sport fishing license is required (unless exempt by 49-7-9) to harvest crawfish and freshwater shrimp from public waters for personal use. A freshwater commercial fishing license is required to sell crawfish and freshwater shrimp harvested from public waters. Shrimp and crawfish traps fished in public waters shall be marked with a waterproof tag provided by the angler, which shall contain either the license holder's MDWFP number or the full name, residence address and zip code of any angler exempt from purchasing a license.

There is no limit on the number of crawfish traps and freshwater shrimp traps a person may fish.

Crawfish traps are any device constructed of coated wire with openings of throats or flutes not exceeding 2 inches and are used for the sole purpose of taking crawfish. Any commercially available crawfish trap with openings of the throats or flutes not exceeding 2 inches may be used.

Shrimp traps—It is illegal to take or attempt to take freshwater shrimp by the use of any trap which exceeds the following dimensions: 36 inches long (from the rear of the heart to the leading edge of the trap), by 24 inches wide (between the leading edges of the trap, or heart opening), by 12 inches high; or has external or unattached wings, weirs, or other devices intended to funnel shrimp to the trap heart.

AREAS CLOSED TO TROTLINES, THROW LINES, SET HOOKS, LIMBLINES, FFFD'S, JUGS, AND YO-YOS:

- Aberdeen Lock spillway downstream to U.S. 45 overpass, including auxiliary spillway and associated bank fishing access area in the Tombigbee River cutoff below the dam.
- 2. All spillways listed in the Spillway Restrictions section.
- All State Park Lakes and State Fishing Lakes.
- 4. Amory Lock downstream to MS Hwy 6 overpass.
- 5. Fulton Lock downstream to MS Hwy 78 overpass.
- 6. G.V. Sonny Montgomery Lock downstream to mile marker 406.
- Glover Wilkens Lock downstream to mile marker 375
- 8. Jamie L. Whitten Lock downstream to MS Hwy 4 overpass.
- 9. John Rankin Lock downstream to mile marker 398.
- 10. John C. Stennis Lock spillway downstream to mile marker 334, including auxiliary spillway and associated bank fishing access area in the Tombigbee River cutoff below the dam.
- Lake Washington: Limblines and set hooks may not be fished or set, but sportfishing trotlines, FFFD's and yoyos may be used.
- 12. Ross Barnett Reservoir: Pelahatchie Bay, Pelahatchie Creek, and the area of the reservoir north of the main dam and south of a line between the point where Twin Harbors channel enters the main lake in Madison County and the Fannin Landing boat launch in Rankin County; within 100 yards of any sandbar or public boat launching facility within the main lake or river; in any marked navigational channel between State Highway 43 and Ratliff Ferry in Madison County.
- 13. Sardis Lower Lake from the outlet structure to Spaulding Creek, except that FFFD's are permitted in Sardis Lower Lake.

SPILLWAY RESTRICTIONS

Special restrictions apply to spillways at the following lakes:

- 1. Aberdeen and Columbus spillways.
- 2. Arkabutla, Enid, Grenada, Sardis, Okatibbee, and Ross Barnett Reservoirs from the spillway outlet to the end of the rip rap.
- 3. Bluff Lake spillway in Noxubee County.

4. Lowhead dam on Ross Barnett Reservoir from the dam to the end of the Idle Speed Only/No Wake Zone Area downstream of the dam.

From December 1 until the last day of February anglers fishing these waters may use no more than one pole or rod per person (except those in the lowhead dam area of Ross Barnett Reservoir) with no more than 2 single hooks. Single hooks must be at least 1 inch apart and must be no larger than #2.

From March 1 to November 30 anglers may use no more than one pole or rod per person (except those in the lowhead dam area of Ross Barnett Reservoir) with no more than 2 single hooks of any size. Single hooks must be at least 1 inch apart.

No more than 2 artificial lures with no more than 3 treble hooks no larger than #2 may be used year round.

The use of bare or baited treble hooks is illegal in these spillway areas. No other gear may be used in these waters except for dip or landing nets, cast nets, boat-mounted scoops, wire baskets, minnow seines, and minnow traps that can be used to capture shad and minnows. Anglers keeping legal fish caught with these gear types in these waters, except for Lowhead dam in Leake County on Ross Barnett Reservoir, must immediately place their catch on ice or in a dry container. All game fish caught with these gear types must be released immediately upon capture.

GRABBLING SEASON

Grabbling is open from May 1 to July 15. Grabbling is fishing for non-game fish, most notably catfish, with your hands or with rope (no attachments). Only wooden containers may be used. It is illegal to place or take fish from structures such as plastic or metal barrels, hot water tanks, concrete pipe, tires, and other non-biodegradable materials in any public waters of the state. It shall be illegal to place any cavity-type structure, intended to be used for handgrabbling purposes, in all Mississippi water of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

It is unlawful to alter any natural areas by placing boards, wire, or any other obstruction to logs, holes, etc., or to take fish from such altered devices. It is also unlawful to raise any part of a natural or wooden container out of the water thereby aiding in the capture of enclosed fish.

FISH ATTRACTORS

It shall be illegal to place structures such as plastic or metal barrels, plastic or metal pipes and tubing larger than 4 inches in diameter, hot water tanks, concrete

pipes and tires, and any other nonbiodegradable material into the public waters of the state for use as fish attractors. However, wooden materials and plastic tubing and pipe materials may be used as fish attractors provided that the plastic materials are no larger than 4 inches in diameter. Concrete, rope, wire, and nails may be used to make fish attractors. Written permission to place such legal fish attractor materials into public waters must be obtained from the federal or state agency which owns the specific water body. The person placing such fish attractor material into the public water must carry a copy of the written permission on them at all times when transporting and placing such material. A permit is required to place fish attractors and grabbing boxes in Ross Barnett Reservoir. To apply for a permit, call the Ross Barnett Reservoir office at (601) 856-6574.

ILLEGAL FISHING METHODS

It is unlawful to take any fish species by muddying and by the use of lime, poison, explosives, electrical devices, wire baskets, fish traps, or dip nets; except that shad and minnows may be taken by residents only as specified below under the Bait section. It is illegal to take fish, crawfish, or shrimp from, tamper with or use any sport fishing gear without the consent of the gear's owner.

No person shall stock, place, release, or cause to be released into any of the public waters of the state any aquatic species without first obtaining a permit from the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks.

BAIT

Sport anglers may use game fish, nongame gross fish, goldfish, and minnows for bait, as long as they were legally taken and you do not possess more than the daily creel limit. It is illegal to harvest, possess, or use mussels for bait. Anglers can harvest minnows, non-game gross fish, and nongame fish for personal use as bait without a commercial fishing license. A freshwater commercial fishing license is required to sell those fishes legally taken in minnow seines and minnow traps from public waters. No minnows caught in public waters shall be taken outside of the state for sale. Shad and minnows may be taken for sport fishing bait using dip/landing nets, cast nets, boat mounted scoops, and wire baskets by residents only for personal use during sport fishing. Minnow seines and minnow traps can be used to harvest minnows, nongame gross fish, and nongame fish for bait. Minnow seines must be no more than 25 feet in length and 4 feet in depth. Minnow traps shall be constructed of glass, plastic,

nonmetallic, or wire mesh not more than 32 inches in length and 12 inches in diameter without leads or wings and having an entrance no larger than 1 inch in diameter. All game fish caught with these gears must be immediately returned to the water. Freshwater mussels cannot be collected or used for bait (State Law 49-9-5). Fish caught for bait in spillway areas must immediately be placed on ice or in a dry container.

SALE OF GAME FISH

It is illegal for any person, while in Mississippi, to buy or sell, offer for sale, or exchange any game fish harvested in Mississippi or coming from another state.

COMMERCIAL FISHING

It shall be illegal to possess while on the water, both commercial and sport fishing gear in the same boat. See the Commercial Fishing brochure for information or go to www.mdwfp.com/fishing-boating/ freshwater-commercial/.

STATE BORDER WATERS

Mississippi resident licenses are valid for fishing certain state-line waters including:

- 1. Pickwick Lake
- 2. Aliceville Pool
- 3. Mississippi and Pearl Rivers and border lakes along these rivers where they are the boundaries between Mississippi, Tennessee, Louisiana, and Arkansas.

In Mississippi waters that border adjacent states, the legal number of FFFDs shall be that of the adjacent state or the Mississippi limit, whichever is greater, but not to exceed 50 per individual. Yo-yos and FFFDs must be attended during daylight hours on borderline waters between Arkansas and Mississippi.

PUBLIC WATERWAYS

Public waterways are defined in Miss. Code Ann. §51-1-4, and set forth on a map at www.mdeq.ms.gov/water/surface-water/public-waterways/ by the Mississippi Department of Environmental Quality. All citizens of the state of Mississippi and other states have the right to use the public waterways for free transport, fishing, and water sports. Any person using the public waterways of the state does so at his or her own risk. The use of public waterways of the state does not entitle any person to trespass upon any lands adjacent to the stream or waterway. No person using the public waterways may harm or disturb the banks or bed of the stream, nor may any person hunt, fish, or go across any adjacent lands under floodwaters outside the natural banks of the waterway. The right of the public to use the public waterways does not include the use of motorized vehicles (ATVs, trucks, etc.) on the streambed. Exceptions to this prohibition are set forth in Miss. Code Ann. §51-1-4.

CREEL LIMIT

The creel limit is the specified maximum number of fish a person can take in one day.

TRANSPORT LIMIT


No person shall transport more than seven daily limits of game fish for each licensed or exempt angler present in the vehicle. A single angler may only transport his or her own daily limit(s) of fish, not to exceed seven daily limits.

LENGTH LIMIT

While fishing areas with established MDWFP length limits all game fish must be intact (with head, tail, skin, and scales) and comply with length limits for that body of water.

HOW TO MEASURE A FISH

Lay the fish on its side, with the mouth closed and the tail lobes pressed together. Measure the total length from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail. Paddlefish are measured from the front of the eye to the fork of the tail.



Total Length (using a flatboard)

Minimum limit: Fish measuring equal to or shorter than the regulated size length must be returned to the water immediately after capture and may not be possessed on designated waters. Fish exceeding the minimum length may be kept.

Maximum limit: Fish measuring equal to or longer than the regulated size length must be returned to the water immediately upon capture and may not be in possession on these designated waters. Fish shorter than the maximum length limit may be kept.

Slot length limit: Fish measuring equal to or between the designated range in inches must be returned to the water immediately upon capture and may not be in possession on these designated waters. Fish shorter than or longer than the designated range may be kept.

On all other lakes, there is no length limit for any species except Striped Bass and/or Striped Bass hybrids and Paddlefish but the statewide daily creel limits apply.

Mississippi State Fishing Lakes

MDWFP operates 19 prime fishing lakes throughout the state which offer outstanding fishing on more than 3,400 acres of picturesque waters.

Sport fishing licenses and permits are required to fish these lakes, except on the first weekend of National Fishing Week which is June 1-2, 2024, when fishing permits are free, and a sport fishing license is not required for Mississippi residents. Exempt lake permits include Veterans and Active Service Members (proof of status is required).

Only rod and reel or pole fishing is allowed on State Fishing Lakes and State Park Lakes except that carp, gar, buffalo, and bowfin may be taken by use of bow and arrow at night with a valid permit for fishing and/or boating. No other gear is allowed.

Fishing is not allowed from courtesy piers adjacent to boat ramps. Night fishing is allowed at all State Fishing Lakes (except for Lake Bill Waller) from the bank or from boats that are in compliance with state and U.S. Coast Guard regulations.

Camping reservations are not available at State Fishing Lakes. **Call the lake for camping availability**.



CONSUMPTION RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Mississippi State Department of Health recommends that people limit the amount of largemouth and spotted bass and large catfish over 27 inches that they eat from these areas because of high levels of mercury in the fish. Children under seven and women of childbearing age should eat no more than one meal of these fish every two months. Other adults should eat no more than one meal of these fish every two weeks.
- 2. The Mississippi State Department of Health recommends that people limit the amount of 33"-39" king mackerel they eat from the Mississippi Gulf Coast. Do not eat king mackerel greater than 39". Children under seven and women of childbearing age should eat no more than one meal of these fish every two months. Other adults should eat no more than one meal of these fish every two weeks.
- 3. Do not consume any fish from these waters. Closed to commercial fishing. Precautionary advisory issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for Yazoo National Wildlife Refuge.
- 4. The Mississippi State Department of Health recommends that people eat no more than one meal every 2 weeks of buffalo, carp, gar, and catfish over 22 inches from all waters in this area, except for Steele Bayou, Black Bayou, Bee Lake, RecCon Lake (Rainey's Lake) and Lake Charlie Capps.

DDT (dichloro-diphenyl-trichloroethane) is an insecticide whose use in the United States was banned in 1972. PCBs (polychlorinated biphenyls) are chemicals whose production in the United States was banned in 1978.

• Boating, swimming, littering, and alcoholic beverages are not allowed, except where noted. City or county ordinances may also regulate activities at these waters.

B. Brookhaven Fishing Pond will only be open for fishing to persons 14 years old and younger or handicapped persons of any age, as defined in this Rule.


