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

WHAT'S NEW FOR 2023

Changes or additions are highlighted in yellow throughout the document.

- There is a new multi-unit, controlled youth archery elk hunt.
- Pronghorn hunts in the Beatys Butte Unit have changed.
- Vehicles transporting wildlife or wildlife parts must now stop at signed inspection stations, if encountered.
- Powers Unit has been added to the General Archery Buck Deer-Western Oregon season for traditional bow hunting only.
- Multiple Travel Management Area (TMA) effective period dates have changed in central and northeast Oregon units.
- Controlled hunt draw results (except Spring Bear) will be released on June 12.
- Keep your eye out for all of the highlighted changes not listed above.

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LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

License Requirements

All Hunters

- Must have a valid hunting license.
- Hunting licenses are valid beginning January 1, or from time of purchase if after January 1, through December 31 of the document year.
- No one may possess more than one valid annual hunting license.
- Any hunter with a valid Oregon or Idaho hunting license may hunt in the waters or on

- the islands of the Snake Rvr, where the river forms the boundary between the two states. All laws and rules of the respective states apply.
- To hunt big game you must have in possession a big game tag, either electronic or paper, valid for the dates, area, and species being hunted.
- Certain licensing exceptions apply to youth, active duty military, veterans, and landowners. See pages 22 26.
- Any documents in possession, either electronic or paper, must be accessible immediately upon request by Department staff or law enforcement.

Oregon Residency Requirements

- To qualify as an Oregon resident, you must physically reside in Oregon for not less than six consecutive months immediately prior to the date of applying for a license, tag, or permit. See page 91 for complete definition.
- Resident does not include a person who:
 - » Merely owns property or pays property taxes in Oregon.
- » Claims resident privileges in another state or country.
- · Submitting a false application is a crime.



Report On Your Deer and Elk Tags by the Deadline to Avoid \$25 Fee!

Deadlines:

For all hunts that end April 1 - Dec. 31, 2023, the deadline is Jan. 31, 2024 For all hunts that end Jan. 1 - March 31, 2024, the deadline is April 15, 2024

Hunters that report on time are entered to win a special big game tag of their choice (deer, elk or pronghorn antelope). This special tag allows the hunter an extended season and expanded hunt area.

LICENSE, TAG, AND PERMIT FEES

HOW TO BUY LICENSE, TAGS OR PERMITS

There are three ways to buy a license, tags and/or apply for a controlled hunt:

- Buy online at MyODFW.com and choose electronic documents; carry them on the MyODFW app on your smartphone or tablet
- Buy online and choose paper documents; print at home
- Buy from a license sales agent or ODFW office that sells licenses; they can print your documents on regular paper or help you purchase electronic documents



CONTROLLED HUNT APPLICATIONS AND TAGS

What is a Controlled Hunt?

Unlike general season hunts where anyone can buy a tag over-the-counter, controlled hunts are limited entry hunts that require you to apply in advance for the opportunity to draw a tag in ODFW's controlled hunts drawing. Much of Oregon's deer and elk hunting is limited entry — along with all pronghorn antelope, bighorn sheep, Spring Bear and Rocky Mtn goat hunting.

How Does the Controlled Hunt Draw Work?

Each controlled hunt application is assigned a unique seven-digit random number. A sevendigit seed number is drawn for each hunt series, which serves as a starting point for determining which applications successfully draw a tag for each hunt within the series. For deer, elk, pronghorn and spring bear hunts (Premium Hunts excluded), most tags (75%) are awarded to those first choice applicants with the most preference points. The remaining 25% are awarded randomly amongst all first choice applicants, so everyone that applies always has a chance to draw their first choice hunt. If tags remain after all first choice applicants have been successful, then remaining tags are distributed randomly amongst all second choice applicants, and so on through fifth choice applicants if tags remain. Preference points are not considered in selection of application choices two through five.

For bighorn sheep, Rocky Mtn goat, and premium hunts, there are no preference points, all tags are awarded based on a random draw.

Controlled hunts are divided into hunt series based on species, and then further divided into hunt numbers based on location. Hunters can submit one application with up to five hunt number choices in each hunt series each year.

Hunt Series:

- 100 Buck Deer
- 200 Elk
- 400 Pronghorn Antelope
- 500 Bighorn Sheep
- 600 Antlerless Deer
- 700 Spring Black Bear
- 900 Rocky Mountain Goat
- L Premium Deer
- M Premium Elk
- N Premium Pronghorn Antelope

Preference Points **Explained**

Every year you do not draw your first choice hunt you get a preference point, which increases your odds in future years. If you draw your first choice hunt, your preference points are reset to zero whether or not you actually purchase the tag. An exception to this is for Pioneer License holders or a Resident Disabled Veteran License holder who is 65 years of age or older, who have their points reset to one rather than zero when they are successful in drawing their first choice hunt. Preference points are tracked by your ODFW ID# and are maintained until you are successful in drawing your first choice hunt for a series.

If you cannot hunt this year, or choose to hunt in a general season, apply for a point saver to gain a preference point and increase your odds in future years. You must have a hunting license. You cannot apply for other hunt choices within the same series as a point saver. Exception is apply for an LOP hunt as a sixth choice by the May 15th deadline. If you do not go through the draw, you can also apply for a point saver for each hunt series July 1 through November 30. You cannot apply for other hunt choices within the same series if you apply for a Point Saver (i.e. no second choice hunt selections are permitted).

Youth applying for Point Savers cannot apply for a First Time Youth tag in the same series in the same year.

How Do I Apply for a Controlled Hunt?

Step 1: Choose a hunt.

Controlled hunts are broken down by species and location. All hunts are listed by hunt series in the hunt tables, and each hunt has a unique hunt number. You may select up to five hunt choices per series (1st choice, 2nd choice, 3rd choice, etc.). Most tags run out after the 1st choice drawing. Keep in mind that your first choice hunt is the most critical because preference points and the 25% pool only apply to first choice hunts.

You can get an idea of your odds of drawing a hunt by looking at the controlled hunt tables in the Big Game Regulations, where you will see the number of tags and number of 1st choice applicants from the previous year. Tag numbers and applicants can change from year to year, but usually not by large amounts. Previous draw reports are available by logging into your ODFW account and selecting Download Controlled Hunt Reports or they can be viewed online, myodfw.com/articles/point-summary-reports

Step 2: Decide if applying as an individual or in a party.

Many hunters choose to join together with family and friends and apply for a hunt as a party. This means that either everyone in the party will draw a tag, or no one will. Parties will not be split if the nonresident maximum is reached for any hunt or if not enough tags remain in the hunt for all party members to draw. Parties composed solely or partially of nonresidents will not be eligible to receive tags in a hunt after the nonresident maximum is reached. When applying as a party, all applicants must purchase separate applications and individual preference points are combined and then averaged for the group (averages of .51 and above will be rounded up, and averages of .50 and below will be rounded down). You must indicate whether you are applying as a party member or party leader. The party leader must apply before the party member(s). Party members must include the party leader's ODFW ID# on their applications, and the party leader's choices will apply to the entire group. There are no party applications for bighorn sheep, Rocky Mtn goat or premium hunts.

Step 3: Get a hunting license.

To apply, you must first purchase an annual hunting license. You can purchase the hunting license at the same time you apply for a controlled hunt. You can buy a license and apply online, at a license sales agent, and at ODFW offices that sell licenses.

Step 4: Complete your application and apply by February 10th for spring bear, and May 15 for all other big game species.

Once you have completed steps 1-3 above, you are ready to apply for your tag! If you have already purchased a general season deer or elk tag you will not be able to apply for a 100 series or 200 series hunt, respectively. Get your application right — simple mistakes can derail your chances of drawing a tag. Triplecheck your hunt number (and party leader's number if applying with others) to make sure they are correct. If applying at a license sales agent, check your application before you leave the store and get a receipt showing your hunt choices. Keep your receipt for proof of application. If you chose to apply online on your own device, check your controlled hunt application in your online account to verify it

A controlled hunt application that needs to be changed can be done in the customer's online account by the customer through May 25. The customer can make as many changes as they want with no additional fees. If you choose to go to an ODFW office there will be a \$2.00 handling fee for each time a controlled hunt application is changed.



Step 5: Wait for draw results.

Results (successful or unsuccessful) will be made available by February 20 (spring black bear) and June 12 (other big game). Check draw results by logging into your ODFW account or visiting a license agent.

Step 6: After the draw.

If you drew the tag, congratulations! But don't forget to claim your tag before the first hunt period begins. If you purchased a Sports Pac, you still need to redeem your tag voucher for the tag for your particular hunt.

If you didn't get your first choice hunt, you now have a preference point for that hunt series for next year's draw. Points are affiliated with a hunt series, not a particular hunt number, so even if you change your mind and choose a different hunt next year, the point goes with you.

Hunters have the option of deciding whether or not they want to purchase the tag for the hunt choice drawn, but if their first choice hunt is drawn they will lose their preference points.

If you did not draw a tag check out general season opportunities.

Step 7: Report your results.

Don't forget to report on your tag! See pg 18 for details.

Leftover Controlled Tags

Leftover controlled tags are not available as an additional tag.

Leftover spring bear tags go on sale March 15 at 10:00 am (PST), leftover tags for all other big game species go on sale July 1st at 10:00 am (PST). Leftover tags are only sold online. For more information please go to: MyODFW.com

Cancelled Hunts

It is rare but occasionally hunts are cancelled in response to an unexpected event such as winter kill or disease outbreak. Information about any cancelled hunts will be made available by Apr. 15. An email will be sent to all applicants who apply for a hunt that is cancelled by Apr. 15, stating the hunt applied for has been cancelled and detailing their options. If ODFW does not receive a response from the applicant, their second hunt choice will become their first choice. If that hunter is successful in the draw, no preference points are awarded and existing preference points will return to zero. If unsuccessful, applicants will receive a preference point.

Nonresident Applicants

A maximum of 3% of tags for pronghorn antelope and a maximum 5% of tags for controlled deer, elk and bear hunts can be issued to nonresidents. No less than 5% and no more than 10% of all bighorn sheep and Rocky Mtn goat tags will be issued to nonresidents. Less than the maximum percentage may be issued, as nonresident applications receive no preference other than existing preference

points in the drawings. The Guides and Outfitters Program impacts the number of nonresident tags available in the drawing.

Guides and Outfitters

The Guides and Outfitters Program provides guides and outfitters with the opportunity to market nonresident tags. A number of tags equal to one-half the nonresident tags drawn in the previous year are available through this program. Guides certified by the Oregon State Marine Board submit applications and compete for the right to market these tags. Tags not sold to guides by Apr. 15 are available in that year's big game drawing. TIPS FOR E-TAGGING

Oregon State Police and ODFW want to remind hunters and anglers that it is your responsibility to e-tag your fish or animal correctly:

- Make sure you have the MyODFW app (which lets you tag when out of cell reception) and that it's updated.
 Login to the MyODFW app and sync while you have internet service.
- Be sure to buy your big game tag or redeem your Sports Pac tag voucher by the deadline.
- Immediately tag your fish or animal after harvest—and enter all required information properly.
- Put the device in Airplane Mode if you are having problems tagging or opening the app while you are in the field.
- Keep your device charged with a portable charger or other method as you must be able to show your e-tag to OSP.

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Hunting Regulations

Shooting Hours

Game mammals may only be hunted from 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset.

Aircraft, ATVS, Boats, Drones, Vehicles It is unlawful to:

- Hunt or harass any wildlife from a motorpropelled vehicle.
- Hunt within eight hours of having been transported by, communicating with, or having received information on the location of a game mammal from an aircraft.
- Use drones for the following purposes:
 - » Hunting, trapping, or angling.
 - » Aiding hunting, trapping, or angling through the use of drones to harass, track, locate or scout wildlife.
 - » Interfering in the acts of a person who is lawfully hunting, trapping or angling.
- Operate or be transported by a motorpropelled vehicle in violation of a motor vehicle use restriction. This includes electric assisted bicycles, and aircraft, except for those landing on a designated air strip.
- Operate a snowmobile or ATV, unless firearms and bows are unloaded except for the following circumstances:
 - » A person who is licensed to carry a concealed handgun in Oregon
 - » A current or honorably retired law enforcement officer

For this regulation "unloaded" means:

- » Revolver no live cartridge in the chamber that is aligned with the hammer
- » Muzzleloader not capped or primed
- » Bow all arrows in the quiver
- » All Other Firearms no live cartridge in the chamber

See ORS 821.240 for complete statute language.

- Cast an artificial light from a motor vehicle while in possession of a weapon; or cast an artificial light upon a game mammal, predatory animal, or livestock from within 500 feet of a motor vehicle while in possession of a weapon.
- Shoot game mammals from or with the help of any motorboat or sailboat unless the motor has been shut off and/or sail furled and movement caused by any motor or sail has stopped.

Parts Ban

Except for the following parts, no person shall import or possess all or parts of a cervid (deer/elk family) carcass into Oregon from another state or country. Common cervid species include deer, elk, moose, and caribou.

The following parts are allowed:

- Meat that is cut and wrapped commercially or privately;
- Meat that has been boned out;
- Quarters or other portions of meat with no part of the spinal column or head attached;
- Hides and/or capes with no head attached;
- Skull plates with antlers attached that have been cleaned of all meat and brain tissue;
- Entire skulls that have been processed to remove all meat and brain tissue.
- Antlers (including velvet antlers) with no brain tissue attached;
- Upper canine teeth (i.e. buglers, whistlers, ivories);
- Finished taxidermy heads and finished European style skull mounts.

Illegal parts brought into Oregon will be confiscated and persons may be liable for disposal expenses.

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD)

The most important wildlife disease in North America, CWD, is a 100% fatal, infectious,

transmissible spongiform encephalopathy (TSE) of deer, elk, and moose. The disease has not been detected in Oregon. In areas where this neurological disease occurs, it is spread by nose-to-nose contact between animals and through urine, feces and saliva infecting soils and habitats. CWD remains in the soil for an unknown number of years, continuing to infect animals that use infected sites.

Although CWD has not been documented in humans, public health and wildlife officials advise hunters to take precautions when pursuing or handling deer, elk, and moose that may have been exposed to CWD. Basic precautions include:

- Wear latex or rubber gloves when field dressing animals;
- Bone out the meat, do not saw through the brain or bone, especially the backbone;
- Minimize the handling of brain and spinal tissues;
- Avoid consuming the meat from any animal that tests positive for the disease.

If you will be hunting in an area where CWD may occur, more detailed information regarding precautions to take when handling animals that may have been exposed can be found online at http://cwd-info.org/recommendations-for-hunters-simple-precautions/.

Other Restrictions

It is unlawful to:

- Refuse inspection of any license, tag, or permit, and any wildlife taken, by an employee of ODFW, any person authorized to enforce wildlife laws, or a landowner or agent of the landowner on their land.
- Refuse inspection of any gear used for the purpose of taking wildlife by an employee of ODFW, or any person authorized to enforce wildlife laws.



- Hunt protected wildlife.
- Disturb or remove traps or snares of any licensed trapper while that person is trapping on public lands or on other land by landowner's permission.
- Disturb, damage, remove, alter, or possess any official ODFW signs.
- Knowingly provide false information to the Department or Commission on any report required by law.
- Counsel, aid or assist in any violation of the wildlife laws, or share in any of the proceeds of such violation by receiving or possessing any wildlife. Any person who violates this rule shall incur the penalties provided for the person guilty of such violation.

Hunter Orange

No person younger than 18 years of age shall hunt with any firearm for any game mammal or upland game bird (excluding turkey) unless the person is wearing in a manner visible from all directions a hat or exterior garment of hunter orange.

Disguising Sex, Waste, Sale It is unlawful to:

- Disguise the sex or kind of any wildlife while in the field or in transit from the field.
- Possess the meat or carcass of any deer, elk, pronghorn antelope, bighorn sheep, or Rocky Mtn goat without evidence of sex while in the field, forest, or in transit on any of the hwys or premises open to the public in Oregon, except processed or cut and wrapped meat. Hunters must choose one of two options for proving sex for deer, elk, pronghorn, bighorn sheep, and mountain goat:
 - » Option 1: The animals head or scalp from the eyes to the ears including the antlers or horns for males.
 - » Option 2: A reproductive organ (testicle, penis, udder or vulva) attached to a major portion of meat. For white-tailed deer only hunts and mule deer only hunts, the tail must be retained for proof of species.

Note: Option 1 must be used for deer and elk hunts with antler point restrictions.

- Waste any game mammals or edible portions thereof, except that
 meat of cougar need not be salvaged. See definition on page 91. All
 wildlife crippled or killed in the field must be retrieved immediately,
 if possible, and kept by the hunter in the field. The duty to retrieve
 and to not waste does not justify otherwise criminal conduct
 including but not limited to trespass.
- Sell, trade, barter, exchange, or offer for sale, trade, barter, or exchange, any game mammal or parts thereof except as identified in Oregon Administrative Rule 635, Division 200.

Tagging

There are two options for tagging game mammals for which a tag is issued, paper tags and electronic tags. Hunters must choose one option at the time of purchase.

Paper Tags:

- The owner of a game mammal tag that kills a game mammal for which
 a paper tag is issued, shall immediately validate the tag by writing
 on the tag, in ink, the date and time of harvest, and the Wildlife
 Management Unit where harvest occurred; and attach the tag in plain
 sight securely to the game mammal.
 - » To keep the tag legible, one option is to place it in a plastic bag to protect it.
 - » Paper tags must be signed upon purchase or prior to use in the field.
 - » It is unlawful to have in possession an unsigned tag and/or reproduction/photocopied/resized tag(s).
 - » Resized: In relation to permits and tags, resized means to change the dimensions of a permit or tag, either electronically or physically, from the original size as printed on 8.5" x 11" (letter) paper; trimming to the border of the document itself after printing to original size is allowed.

HUNTING REGULATIONS

Electronic Tags:

- When the owner of any game mammal tag kills a game mammal for which an electronic tag is issued the owner shall immediately validate the tag by pressing the "Validate" button on the image of the tag in the MyODFW mobile application. Follow the prompts and complete the tag validation process by clicking "Save". After validation a confirmation number will become visible.
 - » In addition to validating a tag electronically, the tag owner's name, date of birth, ODFW ID number, harvest date, and confirmation number must be written in ink on material of the tag owner's choice (options include flagging tape, duct tape, and paper in a plastic bag to protect it), and attached in plain sight securely to the game mammal.

All Tags:

- The required information, or paper game mammal tag, must be maintained in legible condition at all times.
- The electronic tag validation information, or paper tag must be kept attached to the carcass or remain with any parts as long as any parts are preserved.

Mandatory Reporting:

 Hunters are required to report, whether you hunt or not, through ELS for all deer, elk, pronghorn, bear, cougar and turkey tags. Reporting deadlines are:

- » January 31, 2024 for hunts ending between April 1 and December 31, 2023
- » April 15, 2024 for hunts ending between January 1 and March 31, 2024
- » Failure to report deer and elk tags by the deadline will result in a \$25 penalty with the purchase of a 2025 license.

Possession and Transportation

- When a game mammal or part thereof is transferred to the possession of another person, including a meat processor or taxidermist, a written record shall accompany such transfer, (see Wildlife Transfer Record Form on pg 104) including:
 - » A description of the game mammal or part being transferred;
 - » The name, address, date of birth, and ODFW ID number of the person who originally tagged the animal;
 - » The issued date and time of a paper tag or the confirmation number of an electronic tag; and
 - » The date and time of harvest.
 - » The written record shall remain with such game mammal or part so long as the same is preserved. The original tag should remain with the portion of the animal retained by the hunter.

- All game mammals in possession in the field or forest or in transit more than 48 hours after the close of the open season for such mammal must be tagged by ODFW or Oregon State Police.
- The operator of a vehicle transporting wildlife or parts of wildlife is subject to administrative inspection of the wildlife or wildlife parts when arriving at a wildlife inspection station with a sign reading "Wildlife Inspection Station" or "CWD Check Station".
 - » The operator of a vehicle transporting wildlife or wildlife parts that fails to stop for inspection may be issued a citation for a Class A violation.
 - » Vehicles not transporting wildlife or wildlife parts are not required to stop for inspection.
- No person shall receive or have in possession any game mammal or part thereof which: (1) is not properly tagged; (2) was taken in violation of any wildlife laws or regulations; or (3) was taken by any person who is or may be exempt from jurisdiction of such laws or regulations.
- No person shall possess or transport any game mammal or part thereof, which has been illegally killed, found or killed for humane reasons, except lawfully obtained shed antlers, unless they have notified and received

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- permission from personnel of the Oregon State Police or ODFW prior to transporting.
- No person shall possess the horns of bighorn sheep or Rocky Mtn goat that were not taken legally during an authorized season.
- No person shall sell, lend, or borrow any big game tags.

Prohibited Methods

It is unlawful to:

- To possess or use a commercial cervid attractant (definition pg 90) that contains or is derived from cervid urine.
- Hunt or shoot from or across a public Rd, Rd right-of-way or railroad right-of-way, except persons legally hunting on Rds closed to use of motor vehicles by the public.
- Hunt for or kill any wildlife for another person.
- Hunt any game mammal with dogs, except western gray squirrel.
- Hunt, locate, or scout for the purpose of hunting any wildlife with infrared or other night vision sight or equipment except trail cameras.
- Use an artificial light for hunting any wildlife, except raccoon, bobcat and opossum provided the light is not cast from or attached to a motor vehicle. This includes laser sights or any other sights which project a beam to the target, including scopes with electronic rangefinders and

- scopes that receive information from a rangefinder or any electronic device. This does not include battery operated sights which only light the reticle.
- · Take game mammals with trap or snare.
- Use any poisoning, immobilizing, or tranquilizing drug or chemical to hunt or kill any game mammal.

Trespass

It is unlawful to hunt on private property without permission from the landowner. See ORS 105.700 and 498.120.

The duty to retrieve and to not waste does not justify otherwise criminal conduct including but not limited to trespass.

Hunting Prohibited

It is unlawful to:

 Hunt with a centerfire rifle during the deer and elk seasons and dates in the Wildlife Management Units listed in the Centerfire Rifle Restrictions table without a used or unused deer, elk, pronghorn antelope, bighorn sheep, or Rocky Mountain goat tag valid for the dates and area being hunted.

Remember, party hunting is illegal. A hunter must have an unused tag to hunt a game mammal for which a tag is required.

 Hunt on any refuge closed by state or federal government. Hunt within corporate limits of any city or town; public park or cemetery; or on any campus or grounds of a public school, college, or university.

LEGAL HUNTING WEAPONS FOR GAME MAMMALS

Below are the requirements for weapons that can be used to hunt game mammals. In addition to these restrictions, some controlled hunts or special areas may have further weapon restrictions.

Weapon Provisions for Hunting Game Mammals:

Centerfire Firearm (Rifles, Handguns and Shotguns) It is unlawful to hunt game mammals with:

- .22 caliber rimfire (except for western gray squirrel).
- Fully automatic firearms.
- Semiautomatic rifles with a magazine capacity greater than five cartridges (except for western gray squirrel).
- Tracer or full-metal jacket bullets.
- Infrared, night vision, laser or any other sight that projects a beam to the target, including scopes with electronic rangefinders and scopes that receive information from any electronic device.

Shotgun

Shotguns (see definition on pg 91) with rifled barrels are considered shotguns when used for hunting game mammals when centerfire rifles or shotguns are legal weapons.

Bow

- A bow as described in this section must be used for seasons designated as archery or bow.
- Only a long bow or recurve bow may be used for seasons designated as traditional bow only.

- Only recurve, long, or compound bows are legal for hunting game mammals.
- Broadheads must be unbarbed and at least 7/8" wide. Broadheads with moveable blades that fold/collapse when withdrawn are not considered barbed. Western gray squirrel may be hunted with small game arrow points/heads.

It is unlawful to hunt game mammals with:

- Bows having a draw weight of less than 40 pounds (except no minimum draw weight for western gray squirrel).
- Any device secured to or supported by the bow that maintains the bow at full draw.
- Any electronic device attached to bow or arrow except lighted arrow nocks that have no function other than to increase visibility of the arrow, and cameras that have no other function (such as range finding) than recording images are allowed.

Muzzleloader

During muzzleloader only seasons and 600 series hunts where there is a weapon restriction of shotgun/muzzleloader only or archery/muzzleloader only:

It is unlawful to:

- Use scopes (permanent or detachable).
- Use sights that use batteries, artificial light or energy except for visually impaired hunters with a permit (see pg 28). Open and peep sights are legal, including open and peep sights with fiber optics or fluorescent paint on them.
- Hunt with or have in possession while hunting, sabots or bullets with plastic or synthetic parts. Cloth, paper or felt patches are allowed.
- Hunt with centerfire primers or matchlock as an ignition source.

- Hunt with pelletized powders or propellants. Granular (loose) black powder and black powder substitutes are the only legal propellants.
- · Hunt with a revolving action muzzleloader.

During Any Legal Weapon and Western Gray Squirrel seasons, hunters may use muzzleloaders with any ignition type (except matchlock), any legal sight, any propellant, or any bullet type provided the weapon meets caliber restrictions for the species.

HELP OREGON WILDLIFE

Hunters have a long history of supporting and conserving Oregon's wildlife. Continue that tradition by switching to non-lead ammunition. Non-lead ammunition is available for most rifles, handguns and shotguns.

High performance non-lead bullets have the same stopping power as lead, but leave fewer bullet fragments that can be swallowed by scavengers and other wildlife. Switching to non-lead ammunition means eagles, scavengers, other wildlife and humans will not be exposed to lead fragments in game meat.

Lead can be harmful to wildlife and humans. A nationwide ban on lead shot for waterfowl hunting is credited with saving millions of ducks, geese and waterfowl from lead poisoning. Birds of prey, scavengers and other wildlife can be harmed by eating meat containing lead fragments.

Do your part to help Oregon wildlife. Get the lead out.



Oregon offers numerous youth hunting opportunities intended to promote a safe, enjoyable experience with an increased chance for success. License prices are reduced to make it easier for families to introduce kids to hunting.

Licensing Requirements

- Youth 12 to 17 years of age must purchase a Combination License or Youth Sports Pac to hunt, participate in the big game controlled hunt drawing, or purchase preference points.
- Youth 11 years of age and under do not need a license to hunt game birds, small game, or unprotected wildlife.
- Youth 9 to 11 years of age and older may apply for preference point savers through the controlled hunt drawing provided they purchase a Combination License or Youth Sports Pac. The free Youth Game Bird Hunting License does not allow a youth to participate in the controlled hunt drawing or apply for preference points.
- Youth between 9 and 12 years of age may possess both a free Youth Game Bird Hunting License and a Combination License or Youth Sports Pac.
- A Combination License or Youth Sports Pac purchased by a youth 17 year of age will be valid for the entire calendar year even if the youth turns age 18 before the end of the calendar year. However, youths may not hunt with youth hunt tags once they turn 18 years of age.

Hunter Education

Before hunting, youth 17 years of age or younger must:

- Complete a Hunter Education Course (Any U.S. state, Canada or Mexico).
- Have in their possession a Hunter Education Certificate or a Department issued document with their Hunter Education Certificate number to hunt anywhere except land owned by their parent or

legal guardian. See exceptions under the Mentored Youth Hunter Program.

Hunter Education can be completed with a conventional classroom course or independent study with a hands-on field day. For more information visit: myodfw.com/articles/take-hunter-education-course

Hunter Orange

No person younger than 18 years of age shall hunt with any firearm for any game mammal or upland game bird (excluding turkey) unless the person is wearing in a manner visible from all directions a hat or exterior garment of hunter orange.

Youth Specific Regulations

- No youth 11 years of age or younger may hunt for big game except for youth participating in the Mentored Youth Hunter Program.
- Any youth 13 years of age and under must be accompanied by an adult 21 years of age or older while hunting on property other than land owned by their parent or legal guardian.

Controlled Hunts

- A Combination License or Youth Sports Pac is required for a youth to participate in the controlled hunt drawing.
- A youth 11 years of age may apply in the controlled hunt drawing provided the youth is 12 years of age or older and has completed a Hunter Education Course by the time they participate in the hunt.
- Youth 9 to 11 years of age may purchase point saver applications in the controlled hunt drawing provided they possess a valid Combination License or Youth Sports Pac.
- Only youth 12 to 17 years of age at the time of the hunt may participate in Youth Controlled Hunts.

 Youth are not limited to applying for Youth Controlled Hunts and may choose to apply for other controlled hunts.

Youth First Time Hunt Program

Resident youth are eligible to receive one buck deer (100 series), one antlerless deer (600 series) and one antlerless elk (200 series) provided they have not previously been successful in the controlled hunt drawing for that series. This program provides an opportunity for families to have a back-up plan that ensures beginning youth hunters will get a chance to hunt even if they are unsuccessful in the controlled hunt drawing.

Who May Apply:

- Resident youth 12 to 17 years of age. Youth 11 years of age may apply if they will be 12 years of age by the time they hunt. Youths may not hunt with "First Time" tags once they turn 18 years of age.
- Youth that applied but were unsuccessful for 100, 200, and/or 600 series controlled hunts in the current year controlled hunt drawing and have never drawn a controlled hunt for that respective series.

Eligible Hunts

- The Youth "First Time" Hunt Program applies to all controlled hunts that meet a minimum tag allocation:
 - » Buck Deer (100 series): at least 201 tags
 - » Elk (200 series) antlerless only: at least 51 tags
 - » Antlerless deer (600 series): at least 51 tags

How to Apply:

 If youth meet the criteria above, submit a Youth "First Time" Program Hunt application online to request a tag of their choice from the authorized list of hunts. No additional fee is required for this application. See myodfw.com/articles/ hunting-opportunities-youth for online instructions and a list of qualifying hunts.

- Application period begins July 1st, and must be applied for prior to the day the hunt begins.
- Enter the hunt choice per hunt series to ensure receipt of an eligible hunt (see min. tag level, per hunt series on pg 22). The hunt choices may be different than the hunt choices made in the unsuccessful controlled hunt drawing.
- Youth will be assigned a tag and be able to purchase the tag after their application is processed.
- Tag sale deadlines apply.

Important Things to Know:

- Youth must have completed a Hunter Education Course by the time they participate in the hunt.
- A youth loses eligibility for a "First Time" tag in a hunt series once they have been successful for any hunt choice in that series (including youth hunts and LOP tags), except for leftover tags.
- Preference points will not be used if participating in the "First Time" program.
- Youth that have applied for Point Savers in the respective hunt series for the current year are NOT eligible for a guaranteed "First Time" tag.
- Youth must obtain the controlled hunt tag before the hunt begins.
- Adults who apply in a party with a youth in the controlled hunt drawing and are unsuccessful will not receive tags if the youth requests a "First Time" tag.
- Youth can use their "First Time" options in any combination (all in one year, one per year, skip years between tags).
- Elk (200 series) hunts allowing the harvest of an antlered animal are not eligible for the Youth "First Time" Program.
- Youth can hunt in general seasons and use leftover tags if available without losing eligibility for "First Time" tag.
- "First Time" tags are not additional tags.
- Other hunters with appropriate tags may hunt with youth.

Mentored Youth Hunter Program

The program gives youth the opportunity to receive mentored, one-on-one field training on the ethics, safety, responsibility and enjoyment of hunting while being closely supervised by a licensed adult.

Youth Participation

Resident and nonresident youth may participate in the Mentored Youth Hunter Program, without first passing an approved Hunter Education Program, provided the youth:

- Is 9 to 15 years of age. At age 16, a youth is no longer eligible to participate in the Mentored Youth Hunting Program and must pass an approved hunter education program, possess a Youth License, and appropriate tags.
- Hunts while accompanied by a supervising hunter who is 21 years of age or older and who has a valid license and tag(s) for the dates, area and species being hunted.
- Completes the free annual registration.
 Register Online at: myodfw.com/articles/mentored-youth-hunter-program or at your local license agent.
- Possesses verification of program registration while hunting.
- Follows all hunting regulations.
- Remains under the immediate control of the supervising hunter at all times while the youth is in possession of any legal weapon for the hunt.
- Is wearing a hunter orange exterior garment (shirt, jacket, coat, vest, or sweater) or hat when hunting with a firearm for game mammals or upland birds (except turkey). The exterior garment or hat must have hunter orange visible in all directions (360 degrees).

Supervising Hunter

The supervising hunter shall:

- Have a valid hunting license and tag(s) valid for the dates, area and species being hunted.
- Maintain immediate control of the mentored youth hunter at all times while the youth is in possession of any legal weapon for the hunt.

- Ensure that all Oregon hunting regulations are followed.
- Be responsible and accountable for all actions of the mentored youth hunter while engaged in hunting.
- Supervise only one mentored youth hunter at any given time while engaged in hunting.
- Review information on safe hunting practices, see myodfw.com/articles/ mentored-youth-hunter-program.
- Ensure no more than one legal weapon for the hunt is possessed collectively by the supervising hunter and the youth being mentored at any time while engaged in hunting.

Seasons and Bag Limits

- Any wildlife harvested by the mentored youth hunter shall be counted towards the supervising hunter's bag limit.
- The Mentored Youth Hunting Program is not applicable to designated youth only seasons and hunts.
 - » This is because the mentored youth can only take an animal the supervising hunter could legally harvest and the supervising hunter could not legally harvest an animal during a youth only hunt.

Mentored Youth Preference Points

- Youth participating in the Mentored Youth Hunting Program will receive one mentored youth preference point for each year the youth registers for the program.
- The mentored youth preference points will be "banked" and held in the licensing system with no expiration date. To redeem banked points, see myodfw.com/articles/ mentored-youth-hunter-program for more information.
- Once Mentored Youth Preference Points are redeemed, they are converted to the Preference Point System and are subject to the Oregon Administrative Rules that govern preference points.
- Redeemed points must be used at one time and may not be split among controlled hunt series.

LANDOWNERS

Landowner Specific Rules and Regulations

- A resident does not need a license to hunt on land upon which the person resides and is owned by the person or a member of the person's immediate family, unless they are hunting for a species for which a tag is required or are applying for big game tags.
- A landowner or landowner agent does not need a hunting or trapping license to take predatory animals on land they own, lease, lawfully occupy, possess, or have charge or dominion over.
- Landowners or their agents may hunt predatory animals with a spotlight, and from a vehicle on lands that they legally own or occupy.

Landowner Preference Program

Landowners with a minimum of 40 contiguous acres may qualify for controlled hunts tags on their property. In order to qualify, lands must be registered with ODFW and hunters must apply for hunts through the controlled hunt system.
 Registration and further information on the Landowner Preference Program (LOP) can be found at: myodfw.com/landowner-preference-program or by contacting

- ODFW License Service at 503-947-6101. Registration packets can also be acquired through local ODFW offices.
- Renew registrations and complete tag distribution lists online.
- LOP tags are only valid within the registered property boundaries for which the tag is issued.
- All landowners and eligible applicants must purchase controlled hunt application prior to the deadline. Applications for LOP tags must indicate a landowner preference hunt choice on their application.

LOP Tag Limits

- Antelope hunts with an either sex or a
 one doe or fawn bag limit are available to
 landowners or immediate family through
 the LOP program. All LOP antelope tags
 will be limited to a doe/fawn bag limit.
- LOP tags are not available for 223T or the Aug. 15 Dec. 31 youth elk hunts. In the following hunts LOP tags will be limited to five tags or 10% of the total controlled hunt tags, whichever is greater: elk hunts; 254R1, 254Y1, 255R1, 255Y1, 256R1 and 256Y1: buck deer hunts; 141C, 142B, 143C, 145A, 148A, 154C, 157A and 165R2.
- In addition to the hunts listed, buck mule deer LOP tags may be limited in WMUs below Population Management Objective. The list of affected mule deer buck hunts will be available starting May 1 of each year.

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UNIFORMED SERVICES AND DISABLED VETERANS

The information on this page is a summary of regulations and opportunities related to Disabled Veterans and active duty Members of the Uniformed Services.

Uniformed Services Members

"Uniformed Services" includes Army, Navy, Air Force (along with Space Force), Marine Corps and Coast Guard, or their reserve components; the National Guard or Oregon National Guard, commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and the Public Health Service of the United States Department of Health and Human Services detailed with the Army or Navy.

Resident

The requirement for a person to reside in Oregon for not less than six months to be considered a resident is waived for Members of the uniformed services of the United States who:

- Are permanently assigned to active duty in this state, and their spouse and dependent children; or
- Reside in this state while assigned to duty at any base, station, shore establishment or other facility in this state; or
- Reside in this state while serving as members of the crew of a ship that has an Oregon port or shore establishment as its home port or permanent station.

Nonresident Members of the Uniformed Services

- Must obtain a valid nonresident hunting license.
- A nonresident active duty member of the uniformed services may purchase licenses, general season tags, and permits at reduced rates (see table below).
- Pay nonresident tag fees for controlled hunt tags and are subject to nonresident tag limitations (5% for deer and elk).

Tag Sales Deadlines

Active duty members of the uniformed services with Oregon resident status will be permitted to purchase their general season tag after the deadline.

Uniformed Services Active Duty Controlled Hunt Tags

Oregon's active duty members of the uniformed services stationed outside of the state can obtain a controlled deer, elk, or spring bear hunt tag while on leave during the season. To qualify for these tags the individual must be an Oregon resident currently stationed outside of the state.

- To purchase the tag the active members of the uniformed services must provide the following information to the local ODFW District office responsible for issuing the tag:
 - » A copy of an active duty military ID.
 - » A copy of current leave papers to document they are currently stationed outside of Oregon.
 - » A valid Oregon resident hunting license.

- Tags will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis, beginning March 1 for spring bear hunts and July 1 for deer and elk hunts, until the authorized number of tags have been issued.
- Tags may be issued for:
 - » Spring bear hunts, controlled deer or elk hunts with a bag limit of "antlerless", or "spike only", that have a minimum of 20 tags.
 - » Controlled deer or elk hunts with a bag limit that allows buck deer or bull elk with two or more points on one antler, not counting the brow tine, to be harvested, that have a minimum of 100 tags authorized by the Commission.
 - » Additional tags for active members of the uniformed services for each controlled hunt will not exceed 10% of the tag number authorized by the Commission.
- Active members of the uniformed services Controlled Hunt Tags cannot be authorized for controlled hunts occurring on the Starkey Experimental Forest, Hart Mountain NAR, or Umatilla NWR.
- All hunt specific regulations for the hunt where a tag is issued will apply.
- Tag recipient must pay the standard resident price for the tag.
- Hunter must provide harvest and effort information to the issuing office within five business days after the closing date of the hunt.

Disabled Veterans

Resident Disabled Veteran License

To qualify for a free resident disabled veteran license you must have at least a 25% disabled rating from any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States.

Disabled Veterans are eligible to purchase an elk tag at a reduced price. For an application visit: myodfw.com/articles/ hunters-and-anglers-disabilities

Disabled Veterans Criteria for Oregon Disabilities Hunting and Fishing Permits

To be considered a person with a disability under the wildlife laws, a disabled veteran must provide: Written proof that the last official certification of record by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs or any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States shows the person to be at least 65% disabled (ORS 496. 018).




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DISABILITIES HUNTING AND FISHING PERMIT INFORMATION

Oregon makes hunting and fishing more accessible for people with permanent disabilities.

Who May Apply

In order to be considered a person with a disability under the wildlife laws, a person shall provide either:

- Written certification from a licensed physician, licensed physician assistant or certified nurse practitioner which states that the applicant:
 - » Is permanently unable to walk without the use of, or assistance from, a brace, cane, crutch, prosthetic device, wheelchair, scooter or walker;
 - » Is restricted by lung disease to the extent that the person's forced expiratory volume for one second, when measured by a spirometer, is less than 35 percent predicted, or arterial oxygen tension is less than 55 mm/Hg on room air at rest;
 - » Has a cardiac condition to the extent that the person's functional limitations are classified in severity as Class III or Class IV, according to standards established by the American Heart Association;
 - » Has a permanent, physical impairment that prevents the person from holding or shooting a firearm or bow or from holding a fishing rod in hand; or
 - » Has central visual acuity that permanently does not exceed 20/200 in

- the better eye with corrective lenses, or the widest diameter of the visual field is no greater than 20 degrees; or
- Written proof that the last official certification of record by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs or any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States shows the person to be at least 65 percent disabled (ORS 496. 018).

Accommodations

An "Oregon Disabilities Hunting and Fishing Permit" holder may:

- Hunt from a parked motor-propelled vehicle except on any public road or Hwy, or within Cooperative Travel Management Areas. A public road is the entire right of way of any road over which the public has a right of use. Public roads include, but are not limited to, road related structures that are in the right of way such as tunnels, bridges, or similar structures. Roads on federal, state, or local government lands are public roads. Hunting from a parked motor-propelled vehicle is allowed on private land with the landowner's permission and on public land where offroad travel is permitted.
- Have an able-bodied companion accompany them and kill any animal wounded by the permit holder. The wounded animal must be killed using a legal weapon for the season and species

designated on the tag. The companion must immediately complete the tagging procedure as described on pg 17-18 for the permit holder. The companion is not required to possess a hunting license or tag (OAR 635-065-0090(3)), except a person accompanying a visually impaired hunter is required to possess a valid hunting license and may shoot a game animal on behalf of the hunter while in the presence of the hunter (ORS 498.170).

Assistance From Others

Disabilities listed above must be permanent. A Disabilities Hunting and Fishing Permit will not be issued for temporary disabilities. Permits are valid for five calendar years. To renew a permit, the holder must submit a new, updated application form.

A person who is not visually impaired and who accompanies a hunter who is visually impaired that possesses an "Oregon Disabilities Hunting and Fishing Permit" may:

- assist the hunter in selecting a game animal or bird;
- assist the hunter aiming or sighting a firearm:
- advise the hunter when to fire a firearm;
- shoot a game animal or bird on behalf of the hunter while in the immediate presence of the hunter; and
- tag and retrieve game animals and birds on behalf of the hunter.

The person accompanying a hunter who is visually impaired is required to possess a valid hunting license and may also hunt game animals or birds if the person possesses the appropriate tags, permits, validations and stamps for the area and time period.

COLUMBIAN WHITE-TAILED DEER

Columbian white-tailed deer (CWTD) were once common throughout the valleys of western Oregon. Two populations of CWTD remain; one along the lower Columbia River and the other in the Umpqua Basin near Roseburg. After being federally listed in 1973, the Oregon populations recovered sufficiently and were removed from the state Endangered Species list in 1995. Efforts by ODFW, other state and federal agencies, Douglas County and private landowners led to the removal of the Roseburg population of the CWTD from the federal Endangered Species list in 2003.

Today, CWTD continue to be protected in all of Western Oregon except for a limited number of controlled hunts in the Roseburg area that specifically list CWTD in the bag limit. Hunters are responsible for distinguishing CWTD from black-tailed deer.

Please be sure to pick up an envelope at any ODFW office or license sales agent to submit teeth from any black-tailed deer you harvest this year.

Instructions on how to properly remove the correct teeth are printed on the tooth envelope.



3 pt. + - Bull elk having three points or more on one antler including the brow tine.

Antlerless - Cow or calf elk.

Bull elk -Male elk with at least one visible antler.

One elk - Either sex elk.

Spike elk – Male elk with at least one visible unbranched antler (a brow tine is not considered an antler branch under spike only regulations; the brow tine is the single lowest antler branch below the length of ear, any other tine above a brow tine on the main beam is considered an antler branch).

Private lands will limit access for highlighted hunts. Do not apply unless you have access to a place to hunt.



CHRONIC WASTING DISEASE

Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) has not yet been found in Oregon, but it has been found in Idaho near Oregon's northeastern border. The Department has increased its monitoring efforts throughout the state due to the proximity of CWD to Oregon. House Bill 3152, passed in 2021, requires vehicles transporting wildlife or wildlife parts to stop for inspection if they encounter a Department-operated wildlife inspection station. Refer to page 18 for details. The Department will be operating wildlife inspection stations for CWD sample collection during some fall hunting seasons. Cooperation and sample collection by successful deer and elk hunters in Oregon is needed. Hunters submitting samples will be able to view test results within 4-6 weeks on ODFW's website. ELK HOOF DISEASE

ODFW is asking hunters to report limping elk or animals with abnormal hooves. Report sightings to the ODFW's elk hoof disease online reporting page dfw.state.or.us/wildlife/health_program/elk_hoof_disease/ or call or email ODFW's Wildlife Health Lab (1-866-968-2600 / wildlife.health@odfw.oregon.gov). Hoof Disease can be caused by a bacterial infection causing severe lameness in elk resulting in deformed, overgrown, infected, or sloughed hooves. Hunters finding hoof abnormalities in their harvested animals are asked to take pictures and save all hooves of elk with hoof deformities. Hoof disease does not affect the meat of elk harvested by hunters and poses no risk to human health. However, lame elk may be in poorer body condition and appear thin.




General Season Antlerless Elk Damage

Due to chronic elk damage and increasing private land elk populations, ODFW is piloting a General Season Antlerless Elk Damage Tag. This over-the-counter tag is valid within any of the areas and time periods detailed below. Similar to other general seasons and controlled elk hunts, these tags

are a hunter's only elk hunting opportunity for the year, however, there is no tag sale deadline for these tags.

These hunts are a tool for hunters and landowners to directly work together to reduce elk damage. The hunt areas are nearly 100% private land and largely agricultural

lands. Elk numbers are highly variable within the hunt area as many of the areas are designated as elk de-emphasis areas. **Do not purchase this tag unless you already have access to a place to hunt.** ODFW staff will not be able to assist you with finding a place to hunt.



BIGHORN SHEEP

Additional Regulations

- A person may draw only one controlled bighorn sheep ram tag in a lifetime, excluding ewe hunts.
- A ram is defined as a male bighorn sheep
- A ewe is defined as a female bighorn sheep.
- · No party applications are allowed.



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COUGAR SEASONS

Cougar Regulations

General Season Tag Sale Deadline Oct. 6, see pg 9

Statewide Season:

Jan. 1 - Dec. 31

Using dogs to hunt or pursue cougar is prohibited.

Mortality Quotas: Cougar Zones will be closed to cougar hunting if the quota has been reached. However, quotas are typically not met. See table below for zones and quotas. Quota information is updated regularly at: myodfw.com/cougar-quota-zone

Additional Tag: An additional cougar tag may be purchased throughout the season; however, hunters must purchase the general season tag

prior to the tag sale deadline to be eligible for the additional tag.

Bag Limit: One cougar per tag, except it is unlawful to take spotted kittens or females with spotted kittens.

Mandatory Check for All Cougar

- Any cougar taken must be presented to an ODFW field office or designated collection site within 10 days of the kill to be checked and marked; the person who took the animal is responsible to have it presented.
- Hunters are required to check the unfrozen hide with skull and proof of sex attached
- Hunters are required to submit the reproductive tract of any female cougar taken (see below).


- To make check-in easier, ODFW biologist request hunters use a stick to hold the mouth open so teeth are easier to access
- Check-in must occur by appointment during normal business hours (Mon. - Fri., 8am - 5pm). Please call ahead to make arrangements to have the cougar checked.
- At check-in, hunters must provide
 - » Date, and location including Wildlife Management Unit of harvest.
 - » Complete hunter information including the issued date and time of a paper tag or the confirmation number of an electronic tag; a completed "Wildlife Transfer Record Form" (see pg 104) is an alternative for providing the needed information.
- Hunters must still complete mandatory reporting via the internet.

COLLECTING THE REPRODUCTIVE TRACT FROM A FEMALE BLACK BEAR OR COUGAR

- 1. Label a plastic bag with: issued date and time of a paper tag or the confirmation number of an electronic tag, Date of Kill, Unit Number and Name, County, and Your Name and Address. Ziplock type kitchen or freezer bags work very well for this purpose.
- 2. Locate the "Y" shaped reproductive tract beneath and slightly ahead of the pelvis or hip bones. It usually is necessary to move some of the intestines and other organs aside to locate the entire tract, including both ovaries and the uterus.
- 3. Cut the uterus immediately forward of the bladder. Use caution when handling the bladder and cutting the reproductive tract from the body cavity to insure the meat is not contaminated with urine from the bladder.
- 4. Place the entire reproductive tract in the labeled plastic bag and seal.
- Preserve specimens by freezing as soon as possible and submit to any ODFW district office or check station.



BLACK BEAR SEASONS

Bear Regulations

Bag Limit: One bear per tag, except it is unlawful to take cubs less than one year old or sows with cubs less than one year old.

Within a calendar year, and during authorized seasons, a hunter may harvest:

- One bear with a General Season Fall Tag
- One bear with an Additional General Season Fall Tag
- · One bear with a Controlled Spring Bear Tag

It is unlawful to:

- Use bait to attract black bear and using dogs to hunt or pursue black bear is prohibited.
- Hunt with a centerfire rifle without a valid (used or unused) deer or elk tag during certain time periods and areas; see pg 19.

General Season Fall Tag Sale Deadline Oct. 6, see pg 9

Statewide Season:

Aug. 1 - Dec. 31

Additional Tag: An additional bear tag may be purchased throughout the season; however, hunters must purchase the general season tag prior to the tag sale deadline to be eligible for the additional tag.

Mandatory Check for All Harvested Bears

- The skull of any bear taken must be presented to an ODFW field office or designated collection site within 10 days of the kill to be checked and marked; the hunter is responsible to have it presented.
- Hunters are required to check-in the skull only.
- Skull must be unfrozen when presented for check-in and please prop open mouth so tooth can be accessed. Inserting a stick or dowel between the molars prior to freezing/drying out will help keep jaw open.
- Hunters are requested but not required to submit the reproductive tract of any female bear harvested, see diagram on pg 65.

- Check-in at ODFW field offices must occur by appointment during normal business hours (Mon. - Fri., 8am - 5pm). Please call ahead to make arrangements to have the bear checked.
- At check-in, hunters must provide:
 - » Sex of animal.
 - » Date and location including Wildlife Management Unit of harvest.
 - » Complete hunter information including the issued date and time of a paper tag or the confirmation number of an electronic tag; a completed "Wildlife Transfer Record Form" (see pg 104) is an alternative for providing the needed information.
- Hunters must still complete mandatory reporting via the internet.

THE FOUR PRIMARY RULES OF FIREARM SAFETY

MUZZLE—Control the direction of your muzzle at all times.

TRIGGER-Keep your finger outside the trigger guard until ready to shoot. **ACTION** — Treat every firearm as though it were loaded-open the action and visually check if it is loaded.

TARGET—Be sure of your target and what is in front and beyond it

WEAR HUNTER ORANGE-Most firearm incidents are vision related. All hunters 17 and below must wear a hunter orange hat or vest while hunting big game and all game birds except turkey with any firearm. ODFW strongly encourages all hunters, including adults to wear Hunter Orange.



SMALL GAME HUNTING

Small game species provide a variety of hunting opportunities throughout the state and are an excellent way to introduce new hunters to hunting. Only the appropriate hunting license is necessary to hunt small game (no tags or permits). There are three major categories of small game in Oregon: Western Gray Squirrel, unprotected mammals, and furbearers.

Western Gray Squirrel

The Western Gray Squirrel is a "Game Mammal". A hunting license is required to hunt Western Gray Squirrels. Western Gray Squirrels can only be hunted during the seasons listed below. Exception: No bag limit or closed season in that part of Unit 30 south of Rogue Rvr and S Fork Rogue Rvr and north of Hwy 140.

North - Central Oregon

Open Season: Sept. 15 - Oct. 31 Bag Limit: 3 squirrels daily. Possession Limit: 6 in possession. Open Area: Units 34, 35, 39, 41 and 42.

Remainder of the State

Open Season: Sept. 1 - Nov. 15 Bag Limit: 5 squirrels daily. Possession Limit: 15 in possession. Open Area: Units 10-33, 36-38, 40, 43-77.

Unprotected Mammals

Unprotected mammals are not covered under the game mammal, furbearer, or sensitive species rules. For unprotected mammals, there are no closed seasons or bag limits. However, a hunting license is required and all hunting regulations still apply. Commonly hunted unprotected mammals include coyote, cottontail rabbits, black-tailed jackrabbit, opossum, nutria, California ground squirrel, and Belding's ground squirrels.

- Coyote: Both mouth-blown and electronic calls are legal. Note, if calling coyotes and interested in taking a bobcat, fox, bear, or cougar, if they come to the call, it is necessary to have the appropriate licenses and tags. Bear and cougar require tags, fox and bobcat require a Hunting License for Furbearers; bobcat also require a Bobcat Record Card. (See Furbearers information on this page.)
- Ground Squirrel Hunting:
 - » In eastern Oregon, the medium sized Belding's ground squirrels (often referred to as "sage-rats") are typically hunted from February – July, then they return to their burrows, where they

- spend the next six to eight months. Most "sage-rat" hunting is in pastures and alfalfa fields so getting permission from the landowner is necessary.
- » California ground squirrels ("grey diggers") can be found in western and central Oregon; they are one of the larger ground squirrels. While they can climb, if startled they head for their burrow, which is another way to distinguish California ground squirrels from tree squirrels species that are protected and usually climb a tree to escape. For more information on Oregon's squirrels, check https://myodfw.com/wildlife-viewing/species/squirrels-chipmunks-and-marmots.
- Rabbits and Hares are found throughout Oregon.
 - » Brush rabbits (a variety of cottontail) inhabit the Coast Range, western valleys, and foothills of the Cascades. They can be found feeding and sunning in open areas but will rarely be far from cover. Walking closed logging roads with overgrown vegetation, especially very early in the morning, can produce encounters. While brush rabbits are small, they make for tasty table fare.
 - » Mountain cottontails are found throughout eastern Oregon, primarily in areas with rock outcrops or rimrock, where they use the small gaps between rocks to escape.
 - » Black-tailed jackrabbits are primarily hunted in eastern Oregon in the most open, driest "desert" habitats. Black-tailed jackrabbits can also be hunted in the dry habitat around the outside of alfalfa fields where they forage during the night.
 - » Snowshoe Hares inhabit the mountain ranges of Oregon. Some snowshoe hares, particularly in the Coastal Range, may not turn white in the winter. Few people hunt for snowshoes in Oregon, they tend to live at high elevations where access is difficult in the winter. In western Oregon, like the brush rabbit (a small species of cottontail that is rarely hunted), snowshoes take advantage of dense cover to escape. More information on Oregon's rabbits and hares can be found online at myodfw.com/wildlife-viewing/species/pikas-rabbits-and-hares.

Furbearers

"Furbearers" include beaver, bobcat, marten, mink, muskrat, otter, raccoon, red fox and gray fox. To hunt furbearers, a Furtaker's License or a Hunting License for Furbearers is required. For seasons, bag limits and more information please refer to the current "Oregon Furbearer Trapping and Hunting

Regulations," available at any ODFW office, online at myodfw.com/articles/furbearer-trapping-and-hunting, or by contacting Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, Trapper Education, 4034 Fairview Industrial Dr. SE, Salem, OR 97302; 503-947-6000.

Feral Pigs

Feral Swine, more commonly known as Wild Pigs, are an invasive, non-native species in Oregon that destroy important habitat. Luckily, there are very few feral swine in the state and they are located almost entirely on private land.

It is legal to hunt feral swine year round on public land. There are no bag limits and hunters must have a valid hunting license. On private land, feral swine are defined as "predatory animals." Hunting feral swine on private land does not require a hunting license, but you must have landowner permission to act as their agent.

See The Oregon Department of Agriculture Oregon, Administrative Rule 603-010-0055 for the criteria to determine if a pig is considered to be a "feral swine" and legal to harvest.



PREMIUM HUNTS

Ever wish that your deer, elk or antelope season lasted months instead of days or weeks? Or that you could hunt during the rut? Premium Hunts offer you the opportunity for just that! These hunts give any hunter a chance to draw an additional tag available in nearly every unit with existing deer, elk, or pronghorn hunts. With a Premium Hunts tag, you have months-long deer, elk and pronghorn seasons and an either sex, no antler restriction bag limit. There are no preference points associated with these hunts, so every hunter will have the same chance every year in the random draw. The hunts are not once-in-a-lifetime, so can be applied for and drawn again.

Application Deadline Date: May 15. No party applications. Premium hunts are in addition to controlled and general season tags.

Applications: Hunters may submit one hunt application per premium hunt series, and include up to five hunt choices per application. Standard application fee applies. Preference points, landowner preference tags and guide and outfitter tags are not available for these hunts. Residents and non-residents may apply and have equal opportunity to draw.

Tag Sale Deadline: The day before the hunt begins. Standard tag fees apply.

Tags: One tag is available for each hunt listed.

Bag Limit: One animal. Premium Hunt deer tags are good for any species of deer for which there is a hunt in that unit.

Season: Aug. 1 - Nov. 30

Hunt Area: Entire Wildlife Management Unit unless indicated with an asterisk(*) or as restricted on pages 86-89. See pg 104 for controlled hunt boundary descriptions.





The Raffle Drawing:

- Selection of winners and alternates will begin at 2:00 pm and will progress in the hunt order listed above.
- The winning entrant for each hunt will be selected, followed by the first and second alternates.
- The winner and both alternates for a hunt will be selected prior to drawing the next hunt.
- All entries for a hunt will be sorted electronically by entry numbers.










WESTERN OREGON UNIT MAP

Wildlife Management Units

For the purpose of managing Oregon's wildlife, the state has been divided into separate wildlife management units. Unit numbers are identifiable in smaller subunits by the last 2 digits of the number assigned to the rule description.

Maps are available from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), National Forest (NF), or Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF), as indicated following each description.



COOPERATIVE TRAVEL MANAGEMENT AREAS

Through cooperative agreement, motor vehicle use, including electric assisted bicycles, is limited to specific roads for dates and areas listed below. Maps of most areas will be available by Sept. We do not carry maps of areas that are easily plotted on forestry maps. Old maps should not be relied on because roads open to vehicles may change.

There are two methods of posting roads for motorized travel:

- 1. Negative marking in which closed roads are marked by signs, gates, berms, designated on maps, etc.
- 2. Positive marking in which open roads are marked by round green reflectors (areas below where round green reflectors are used are highlighted in green), orange carsonite posts, designated on maps, etc.

A TMA may use more than one method, for example TMAs with positive markings may also use signs for some situations, such as confusing intersections. No person shall shoot from or across a public Rd or railroad right-of-way, except that persons legally hunting on closed Rds within Cooperative Travel Management Areas (TMAs) are not violating current prohibitions on shooting from or across a public Rd. The same is true for other Rds closed to use of motor vehicles by the public (See WA Regs. pages 86-87). There are additional travel management programs being implemented by other public agencies and private landowners. ODFW has no information for Rd closures not listed on these pages. Hunters need to contact the land management agency or landowner to determine the extent of such closures before going hunting.

ACCESS AND HABITAT "WELCOME TO HUNT", "ACCESS AREA" REGULATIONS

The Department, through the Access and Habitat (A&H) Program, provides hunting access to approximately 35 "Access Areas" on private land.

In Access Areas funded by the Access and Habitat Program that are Welcome to Hunt, hunters are required to follow the area regulations printed on the map produced by the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife for each Access Area. Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) grant provides access to 250,000 acres of Northeast Oregon timberlands. Access & Habitat license dollars along with funds from the NRCS are providing year round public access to 250,000 acres of private timberlands managed by Hancock Forest Management in northeast Oregon. The purpose of the NRCS Voluntary Public

Access and Habitat Incentive Program grant, funded by the 2014 Farm Bill, is to encourage owners and operators of privately –held farm, ranch and forest land to voluntary make that land available for access to the public for wildlife dependent recreation including hunting, fishing and wildlife viewing.

DOGS ON DEPT LANDS

The following rules apply to all Department owned, managed, or controlled areas:

- All dogs must be kept on a leash, except:
 - » While accompanied by a licensed hunter when being used to hunt game birds, including while going to or coming from hunting locations;
- » In a posted dog training area;
- » While the dog is under direct control in a posted parking area, designated campground or on a road currently open to public motor vehicle traffic; or
- » As otherwise specified in 635-008-0112, 0147, 0190, 0211.

A free annual permit comes with the purchase of an annual hunting license, combination license, or Sports Pac. All other wildlife area users need to purchase a permit. Permits are available where fishing and hunting licenses are sold and on the ODFW website: myodfw.com/articles/buying-odfw-wildlife-area-parking-permit.

Hunter Ethics



As a hunter, you are responsible to adopt and follow a **personal code of ethics** that reflects your values

and your respect for wildlife, hunting and pass on the sport of hunting to those who come after you. Remember the following points to help ensure the future of Oregon's hunting heritage.

Respect Landowners

- Ask for permission to hunt well before you plan on hunting.
- Leave all gates the way you find them.
- Follow all landowner restrictions.
- Offer to share part of your harvest with the landowner.

Respect the Resource

- Leave the land better than you found it.
- · Adhere to fair chase rules.
- Know your capabilities and limitations as a marksman.
- Harvest no more than you will use, and take care of what you take.
- Abide by game laws and regulations.

Report hunting violations to the Oregon State Police at 1-800-452-7888 or dial *OSP (*677).

Respect Others

- Follow safe firearm handling practices and insist your hunting partners do the same.
- Know what is beyond your target. Shot pellets can be fatal to both people and dogs.
- Don't interfere with another person's hunt.
- If mentoring a youth hunter, be sure to pass on safe, responsible and ethical knowledge and skills.
- Wear hunter orange when hunting. **Be Safe Be Seen.**

DEFINITIONS

"Adult Hunting License" is a resident or nonresident hunting license, resident combination angler's and hunting license, disabled veteran's angling and hunting license, pioneer's angling and hunting license, or senior citizen's angling and hunting license.

"Agricultural Lands" are lands not less than 10 acres in extent that have been cultivated and planted or irrigated to domestic crops that are currently in use. Isolated home gardens, abandoned farmsteads, logged lands, range lands and tree farms are not included in this definition.

"Antler Point" is a point at least 1 inch in length measured from tip of point to nearest edge of beam. This definition applies only to the 3-point elk and spike only elk bag limits.

"Antlerless Deer" means doe (female deer) or deer fawn (young of the year).

"Antlerless Elk" means cow (female elk) or elk calf (young of the year).

"Bait" for hunting game mammals means any substance placed to attract an animal by its sense of smell or taste, including, but not limited to, food items or minerals (such as salt). Applying a scent or attractant to one's body or clothing while worn is not baiting.

"Broadhead" see Unbarbed Broadhead.

"Buck deer" means a male deer with at least one visible antler.

"Buck Pronghorn" means a male pronghorn antelope with visible horns and a dark cheek patch below the ear.

"Bull elk" for the purposes of a bag limit definition, means a male elk with at least one visible antler.

"Carcass" means the skinned or unskinned body, with or without entrails, of a game bird or game mammal.

"Cervid" means any member of the family Cervidae (deer), including gametes or hybrids.

"Closed Season" is any time and place when it is not authorized to take a specific species, sex, or size of wildlife.

"Commercial Cervid Attractant" means a marketed product that contains or is derived from cervid urine and is designed for use in luring, attracting or enticing a cervid.

"Controlled Hunt" is a season where the number or distribution of hunters is limited through a public drawing or other means.

"Doe or fawn pronghorn", for the purpose of pronghorn bag limits, means a female pronghorn without a dark cheek patch below the ear, or a pronghorn fawn (young of the year) of either sex.

"Drone" means an unmanned flying machine; an unmanned water-based vehicle; or any other vehicle that is able to operate in the air, in or under the water or on land, either remotely or autonomously, and without a human occupant.

"ELS" is an online licensing system available on personal devices, at all locations that sell Oregon's Hunting and Angling licenses. Licenses and tags are electronic or can be printed on plain paper at time of purchase.

"Furbearers" are beaver, bobcat, fisher, marten, mink, muskrat, otter, raccoon, red fox and gray fox.

"Game Mammals" are pronghorn antelope, bighorn sheep, black bear, cougar, deer, elk, moose, Rocky Mtn goat and western gray squirrel.

"General Season" is any season open to the holder of a valid hunting license and appropriate game mammal tag without restriction as to the number of participants.

"Hunt" means to take or attempt to take any wildlife by means involving the use of a weapon or with the assistance of any mammal or bird. Informational Note: As per ORS 161.405 "Attempt" described: A person is guilty of an attempt to commit a crime when the person intentionally engages in conduct which constitutes a substantial step toward commission of the crime.

"Immediate Family" means a landowner's spouse, domestic partner, children, father, mother, brother, sister, step-children and grandchildren. For the purpose of Landowner Preference, "immediate family" also includes brother-in-law and sister-in-law.

"Inedible" means unfit for human consumption.

"Landowner" means a person who holds title in trust or in fee simple to 40 or more contiguous acres of land provided that a recorded deed or contract of ownership shall be on file in the county in which the land is located; and/or a corporation or Limited Liability Company (LLC) holding title in fee simple to 40 or more contiguous acres of land provided that the corporation or LLC shall be registered with the State of Oregon; and/or a partnership holding title in fee simple to 40 or more contiguous acres of land. Persons who hold title as part of a time share are not eligible for landowner preference.

"Muzzleloader" is any single barreled (shotguns may be double barreled) long gun meant to be fired from the shoulder and loaded from the muzzle with open or peep sights. This includes: in-line percussion; sidelock, under-hammer, top-hammer and mule ear percussion; sidelock flintlock and wheelock ignition systems. Matchlock ignition systems are not allowed.

"Nonresident" any person other than a resident.

"One deer" means a buck, doe, or fawn deer.

"One elk" means a bull, cow, or calf elk.

"Possession" means holding any wildlife or parts thereof in custody and any person who counsels, aids, or abets another person holding such wildlife is deemed equally in possession.

"Predatory Animals" (as defined in ORS 610.002) means coyotes, rabbits, rodents and feral swine which are or may be destructive to agricultural crops.

"Protected Mammals and Birds" are any game mammal, game bird, furbearer, Threatened or Endangered species, fisher, ringtail cat, fringed myotis, Townsend's bigeared bat, pallid bat, silver-haired bat, western small-footed myotis, long-eared myotis, long-legged myotis, yuma myotis, pika, pygmy rabbit, white-tailed jackrabbit, white-tailed antelope squirrel, Washington ground squirrel, northern flying squirrel, chickaree (pine squirrel), golden-mantled ground squirrel, chipmunks, white-footed vole, all marine mammals and all nongame birds except European starling, house sparrow, Eurasian collared dove, and rock pigeon.

"Pursue" means the act of trailing, tracking, or chasing wildlife in an attempt to locate, capture, catch, tree, or kill any game mammal, game bird or furbearer.

"Resident" is any person who has; (a) has physically resided in Oregon for not less than six consecutive months immediately prior to making application for a license, tag, or permit; (b) Members of the uniformed services of the United States who: (i) Are permanently assigned to active duty in this state, and their spouse and dependent children, (ii) Reside in this state while assigned to duty at any base, station, shore establishment or other facility in this state, (iii) Reside in this state while serving as members of the crew of a ship that has an Oregon port or shore establishment as its home port or permanent station. (c) Aliens attending school in Oregon under a foreign student exchange program. (d) except for persons who qualify as a resident in (b) or (c), a "Resident" does not include a person who merely owns real property or pays property taxes in this state, or who claims resident privileges in another state or country for any purpose.

"Sabot" is a carrier, bushing or device in which a projectile of a smaller caliber is centered so as to permit firing the projectile within a larger caliber weapon. Cloth, paper

or felt patches used with round balls are not considered a sabot.

"Shotgun" is a smooth bore firearm, designed for firing birdshot and intended to be fired from the shoulder, with a barrel length of 18 inches or more and with an overall length of 26 inches or more. Exception:

Shotguns equipped with rifled slug barrels are considered shotguns when used for hunting pronghorn antelope, black bear, cougar, deer, or elk when centerfire rifles or shotguns are legal weapons.

"Spike elk" for the purposes of a bag limit definition, means a bull elk with at least one visible unbranched antler (a brow tine is not considered an antler branch under spike only elk regulations).


"Tag" is a document (printed or electronic) authorizing the taking of a designated kind of mammal at a specified time and place.

"Take" means to kill or obtain possession or control of any wildlife.

"Three (3) point plus (+) elk" for the purposes of a bag limit definition, means a bull elk having 3 points or more on 1 antler including the brow tine.

"Traditional Bow" is a long bow or recurve bow only, no compound bows are allowed during "traditional" bow/archery hunts.

"Unbarbed Broadhead" is a fixed position arrowhead where the rear edge of the blade(s) forms an angle with the arrow shaft to which it is attached of 90° or greater. Broadheads with moveable blades that fold/collapse when withdrawn are considered unbarbed. Both of the dashed lines (Figure 1) designate an unbarbed broadhead. Blades with rear edges that form an angle of less than 90 degrees in the direction of the arrow tip (Figure 2, for example) are not legal.




"Unprotected Mammals and Birds" means European starling, house sparrow, Eurasian collared dove, rock pigeon and any mammal species for which there are no closed seasons or bag limits. However, all hunting regulations and licensing laws still apply. Common unprotected mammals include coyote, badger,

gophers, moles, mountain beaver, marmots, porcupine, skunks, cottontails, black-tailed jackrabbit, rats, mice, opossum, nutria and weasels.

"Visible Antler" means a velvet or hardened antler that is visible above the hairline on the skullcap and is capable of being shed.

"Waste" means to allow any edible portion of any game mammal (except cougar) or game bird to be rendered unfit for human consumption, or, to fail to retrieve edible portions except internal organs of such game mammals or game birds from the field. Entrails, including the heart and liver, are not considered edible. "Edible portion" of game mammals means 1) the meat of the front quarters as far down as the knees, 2) meat of the hindquarters as far down as the hocks, the meat along the backbone including the 3) loins (back-strap), and 4) tenderloins, for elk it also includes 5) the meat of the neck. See figure below.



"Weapon" means any device used to take or attempt to take wildlife.

"Wildlife" means fish, wild birds, amphibians, reptiles, wild mammals and feral swine.

"Wildlife Unit" means a geographic area described in the section, Wildlife Management Unit Boundary Descriptions, pages 74-81.

Parts of units 16, 19, 21, 22, 30, 31 and 77 as follows: Within wilderness boundaries of Rogue-Umpqua Divide and Sky Lks Wilderness areas and beginning at Detroit; northeast on Breitenbush Rd 46 to FR 4660; east on 4660 to FR 4661; north and east on 4661 to FR 5732; north on 5732 to FR 5730; northwest on 5730 to FR 57; east on 57 to FR 58; north on 58 to FR 5850; north on 5850 to Linney Cr; north on Linney Cr to Salmon Rvr; northwest on Salmon Rvr to FR 2618; north on 2618 to Hwy 26; east and south on Hwy 26 to north boundary at Warm Springs Reservation; northwest on north reservation boundary through Bear Springs to Clear Lk Butte; west and south on the west boundary of the Confederated Tribes of the Warm Springs Reservation (CTWSRO) to the summit of Mt Jefferson; south along the west CTWSRO boundary and the Cascade crest (Jefferson/ Linn Co. line) to the junction of the "crest of the Cascades" with the Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail (PCT) in T11S R8E Sec 17; then south on the PCT to Hwy 20/126 at Santiam Pass; south on Pacific Crest Trail to Southern Pacific Railroad track north of Diamond Peak; southeast on Southern Pacific Railroad track to FR 60; southwest on 60 to Pacific Crest Trail at Windigo Pass; south on Pacific Crest Trail to the boundary of Mt Thielsen Wilderness near Tolo Mt; east and south on eastern wilderness boundary to Pacific Crest Trail near Summit Rock in S36, T28S, R5-1/2E; south on Pacific Crest Trail to Hwy 138; west and north on Hwy 138 to FR 60; northeast on 60 to FR 700; northwest on 700 to FR 770; north on 770 to FR 2154; east on 2154 to FR 362; north on 362 approximately 3/4 mi to FR 2153; north on 2153 to FR 21; west and north on 21 to FR 23; northwest on 23 to FR 5875; north on 5875 to Hwy 58; west on Hwy 58 to FR 5871; north on 5871 to FR 2408; northwest on 2408 to FR 24; east on 24 to FR 1934; north on 1934 to FR 19; east and north on 19 to FR 410; south on 410 to FR 2639; east on 2639 to FR 2638; north on 2638 to Hwy 126; east on Hwy 126 to FR 2654; north on 2654 to FR 15; north on 15 to Hwy 20; west on Hwy 20 to Sheep Cr Rd (FR 2047); north and east on 2047 to FR 2266; east on 2266 to Hwy 22; north and west on Hwy 22 to Detroit, the point of beginning. HUNT 123A and 123R1: Umpqua - 50% public lands. Unit 23 and those parts of

Units 21, 22 and 24 within Douglas Co (not including the BLM North Bank Habitat Mgt Area). Hunters with 123R1 tag may continue to hunt in western Oregon late season archery hunts and must follow the bag limit as outlined on pg 33.

HUNT 123B, 123M2 and 123R2: N Bank Habitat - 100% public lands. No motorized vehicles allowed within the hunt area. N Bank Habitat Mgt Area (Dunning Ranch) - 6,500 acres located approximately 8 mi northeast of Roseburg. Open Area: BLM lands located in T25S, R5W, sections 35 and 36; T26S, R5W, sections 1, 2, 11-14; T25S, R4W, sections 31-33; T26S, R4W, sections 4-8, 18. Hunters with 123R2 unfilled tag after Sept. 25, may continue to hunt in Western Oregon late season archery hunts and must follow the bag limit as outlined on pg 33. [MAP]

HUNT 123M1: Melrose - All of Unit 23, excluding the BLM N Bank Habitat Mgt Area.

HUNT 130R: Rogue-Siskiyou Early Bow - 59% Public Lands. All of units 22, 28, 29, and 30.

HUNT 141A: Hood-White Rvr - 100% public lands. Units 41 and 42 within the Mt Hood Forest Boundary.

HUNT 141M: Hood-N White River - 50% public lands. Unit 42 and that part of Unit 41 north of Dufur Mill Rd (FR44).

HUNT 141R: Hood - White Rvr - 49% public lands. All of Units 41 and 42.

HUNT 141T: The Dalles Watershed -

100% public lands. That part of Unit 41 as follows: 22 sq mi in Unit 41 southwest of The Dalles within the boundaries of The Dalles Watershed. This area is closed to motor vehicles. Entry is allowed only by a valid City of The Dalles permit, only for the duration of the hunt. Any entry into watershed at other times or by persons other than tag holder and two accompanying adult is prohibited. The City of The Dalles entry permit will be limited to the youth with a valid ODFW controlled hunt tag and two adults, 21 years or older, who

HUNTS 170M, 170R1 and 170R2: Hart Mtn - That part of Units 70 and 71 within the boundaries of Hart Mtn NAR. Within the refuge boundary are scattered private inholdings; landowner permission is required to hunt these private inholdings.

HUNT 171A: N Juniper - 45% public lands. That part of Unit 71 north of the following line: Beginning on US Hwy 395 near MP 17, east on Iron Mtn Rd to Double O Rd; east on Double O Rd to State Hwy 205. Excluding Malheur NWR. HUNT 171B: S Juniper - 96% public lands. That part of Unit 71 south of the following line: Beginning on US Hwy 395 near MP 17, east on Iron Mtn Rd to Double O Rd; east on Double O Rd to State Hwy 205. Excluding Hart Mtn NAR, that part of Malheur NWR north of Foster Flat Rd, the Oregon State Park adjacent to Frenchglen and a 120-acre BLM shooting closure surrounding the Frenchglen community.

HUNT 174A and 174R1: N Warner - 60% public lands. That part of Unit 74 north of State Hwy 140.

HUNT 174B and 174R2: S Warner - 35% public lands. That part of Unit 74 south of State Hwy 140.

HUNT 176M: Silver Lake - E Fort Rock - 66% public lands. Unit 76 and that part of Unit 77 east of US Hwy 97.
